IN MEMORIAM

John Conroy Lane
One of the oldest and most respected residents of Glenfinnan passed quietly to his eternal rest on Oct. 25th 1920. Mr. Lane was born at Mt. Mellick, Pownal on Jan. 25th, 1832. After growing to manhood he purchased a farm at Glenfinnan upon which he resided for a number of years. He married Miss Webster but enjoyed only a short period of united life. On Jan. 25th, 1874 he lost his wife and young babe in the Hillsboro River. They were returning from a visit at the home of Mrs. Lane's father and when near their own home the sad accident suddenly took place. He never remarried but after farming for some years he sold his property and made his home with his sister, Mrs. Alexander Jenkins with whom he continued to reside until the time of his death. Mr. Lane united with the Methodist church many years ago and during his long life was ever a faithful and devoted member.

He was a man universally respected and was ever ready to assist in every enterprise that tended to the betterment of the world. During the past few years Mr. Lane was failing in health but seemed nevertheless to take an interest in all that was transpiring. The ending of a long life came quietly and peacefully. He fell asleep and "was not for God to look him". The high esteem in which he was held was manifested by the large number of people that gathered to pay their last respects to one, who, during his life, had ever proved himself to be a true friend. 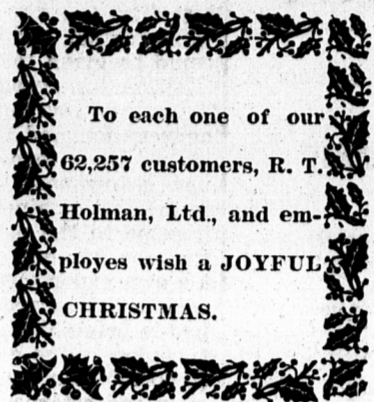

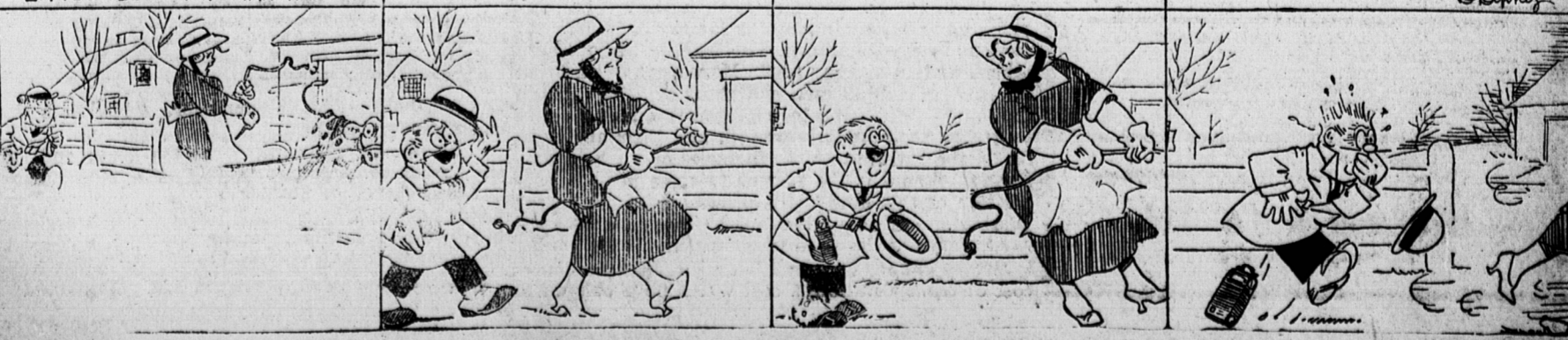
