APPLES GET FANCY PRICES

London, October 10.—The Liverpool Post says: "This season's first arrivals of Nova Scotia apples have brought phenomenal prices, realizing 24 shillings a barrel, best grades. The first steamer brought 34,000 bushels. The increased popularity of these apples proves that they are taking precedence over the English. In consequence of the large home and foreign crops, Canadian and American apples must be sold cheaply on the other side if they are to compete with English fruit this season."
