Dwelling House For Sale By Public Auction

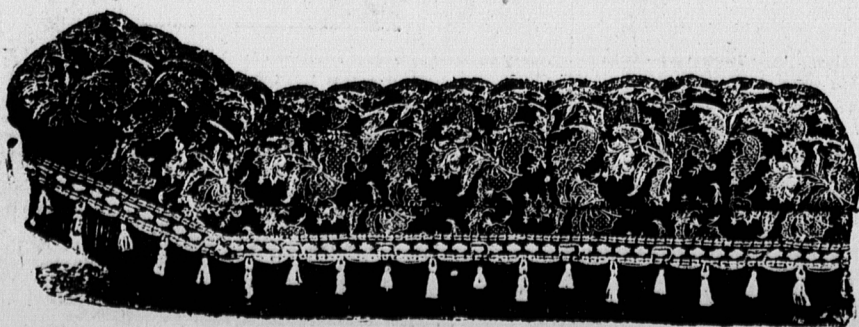

THE PARAMOUNT ISSUE.

There is one public question paramount in Prince Edward Island, one great issue which dominates and overshadows all others; that of all-rail connection between this Province and the Mainland Provinces of Canada.

The Tunnel must be built. In no other way, by no other means known to science can the terms of union be fulfilled, by which we are guaranteed efficient and constant steam communication with the rest of Canada.

The Dominion must face its obligation in that regard, an obligation signed, sealed and delivered thirty-four years ago with all the solemnity and sacredness of a treaty.

The question will not down. The issue cannot be blinked, evaded, or sidetracked. It rises before the Government of the day as a solemn pledge unfulfilled, a debt of honor, long-standing, unpaid, but which must be discharged if Canada is to rest in her faith unruined in the eyes of the world.

This great issue has challenged the attention of Sir John Macdonald, the first Premier of Canada, and of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the last who has succeeded him and more or less of all who bore rule in Canada between them.

It has been urged upon successive Governments of Canada by the Imperial Colonial Office and by the unanimous voice of our Provincial Legislature.

The Island will not, cannot, dare not recede from that demand. Our people will continue to urge it with all their force, with increasing energy, year by year until the demands of necessity, of honor and of good faith are satisfied by the completion of the work.

Canada is well able to do us justice. She has offered in taxes in the years during which we have waited so patiently the price of two Tunnels.

In demanding that the Tunnel shall now be constructed we are asking for no boon or gift at the hands of the rulers of Canada—we are but asking that they shall give us back our own, and we are determined to have it!

There is an election coming. The Tunnel question will dominate all other issues in that contest. Compared with it all questions of Laurier or Borden, of Liberal or Conservative, of party and party policies will be but as chaff before the wind.

Justice to Prince Edward Island, equal rights to come and go, equal rights in trade and transport, the recognition that our people are the equals of any that are Canadian born, these rights, long denied, are the issues that will dominate the contest.

A resolute, determined people, strong in the sense of the justice and greatness of their cause, have nailed the Tunnel colors to the mast and he will be a bold man who dares to flout them. Of this let all Ministers and candidates take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Nor is it any longer a merely local question. New Brunswick wants the Tunnel. Nova Scotia wants it. Halifax, Sydney, Amherst, Moncton, St. John want it. The business men of three Provinces from year to year have voted the demand for the Tunnel.

Great works, involving vast expenditures have been constructed in Central and Western Canada. Other great works are projected which will cost scores of millions. Amongst them the Tunnel must find a place, to link the three Maritime Provinces together.

No public work now or hereafter to be

undertaken in Canada has so many strong claims. Equal justice, solemn treaty obligations, the completion of the physical union of the Provinces, the needs of transportation as well as the commercial emancipation of Prince Edward Island, alike demand that the "missing link" shall be supplied by the completion of all-rail connection at the Cape.

OUR SCHOOL SYSTEM.

Our school system in this Province has been long in operation with little change, while all else has changed since its first adoption. Our political system has been overturned, the introduction of machinery has revolutionized agriculture and radical changes have been made in our industrial and commercial life, while the school system, once comparatively up-to-date, has, in the opinion of many become obsolete. Its defects are certainly very great and radical and there is a growing unrest and dissatisfaction in regard thereto.

The method of school support, which is almost entirely a charge upon the Provincial Government, (with the option to the school district of furnishing a supplement, in most cases absurdly small), would be laughed to scorn in any enlightened country except our own. Our teachers are set to work at an immature age, with but the rudiments of real training for their duties and are paid altogether inadequate salaries. These are among the worst features, but many others might be enumerated. It is easier, however, to tear down than to build. What is wanted is a better system to take the place of that now in operation.

To that end the Teachers' Association have offered a series of prizes for papers in competition, as set forth in another column of this issue. The subjects are, 1st, Improvement in our School System; 2nd, Improvement of School Surroundings; 3rd, A Time Table in Actual Use in an Ungraded School. We heartily commend the well-considered enterprise of the Teachers' Association in offering these prizes, and we trust that such light may be thrown upon the situation by the competing essayists as will prepare the way for a radical and effective reform in our school system.
