## Juvenile Royals Capture City Championship With Three Straight Victories

Walter Lawlor's Juvenile Royals hockey squad yesterday captured the City title and with it the right to meet Borden for the Island crown when they skated to a 1-0 victory over Jack McCourt's Canadiens in the third game of the best-of-five series. ## Joe DiMaggio Comes To Terms With Yankees

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 12—(AP)—Joe DiMaggio came to terms with the New York Yankees tonight in an hour-long conference with president Ed Barrow. Although the salary was not announced, it was believed to be \$42,000.

Both men emerged smiling and Barrow said: "We reached a compromise. That's all I can say."

When pressed for some detail, however, he added that the figure was a little over the \$40,000 offer made to DiMaggio last week and described at that time as final.

DiMaggio said: "I came expecting to have a battle but it was very friendly and satisfactory and I am very happy."

The big centrefielder, who set an all-time record of hitting in 56 consecutive games last year, and was voted the most valuable player in the American League, said he would report tomorrow to Manager Joe McCarthy and would be ready to play or do anything else Joe asked.

He said he weighed 196 pounds and felt "grand."

NEW YORK, March 12—(AP)—A fighting Boston Bruin team that refused to crack under pressure defeated the first-place New York Rangers 2-1 tonight and remained a possibility to crowd Toronto Maple Leafs out of second place in the National Hockey League final standing.

Sharpshooter Roy Conacher scored both Boston goals.

For the Rangers, the goal that stretched their non-stout streak to an even 130 games was scored by Bryan Hextall, league-leading point-getter of the season.

## Tension High As Barrow Arrives In Yankees' Camp

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 12—(AP)—Edward Grant Barrow, president of New York Yankees, arrived in the camp of baseball's world champions today and the tension immediately became high voltage.

He held conferences with executives—Manager Joe McCarthy, farm boss George Weiss, chief scout Paul Kirchell, and perhaps others—watched the club work out.

Some of the rookies, hopeful of sticking with the champions, and some of the veterans, fearful of being traded, cast sidelong glances toward Barrow, Weiss and McCarthy as the trio appraised the practice from an isolated bench far down the right field foul line at Huggins Field.

This was one of the open dates on the club's exhibition schedule being traded, the Yankees break camp at the end of the month, but the players never worked harder or more enthusiastically.

MONTREAL, March 12—(CP)—George Slater, president of the Quebec Senior Hockey League, said tonight that additional police protection had been promised for all Q.S.H.L. games to be played at Quebec City.

Need for additional police at the Quebec Arena had been urged by Cornwall, Ottawa and Montreal Canadiens as a result of a fight between spectators and players at a Canadiens-Quebec game last Feb. 20.

His Athletics may not vacate the American League cellar, but if some of his six-foot pitchers, particularly the rookie contenders, happen to click, they might drag themselves from the depths.

"We have some fine looking boys who might help us a great deal. If not this season, then next year," says Mack. He added that this depends in a large measure on military demands on his youngest recruits.

Nine men have entered the armed forces, taking with them whatever hopes Mack might have had for a serious pennant contender.

The Quebec Amateur Hockey Association today sent its fourth appeal to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, asking for more time to declare a champion for Allan Cup play.

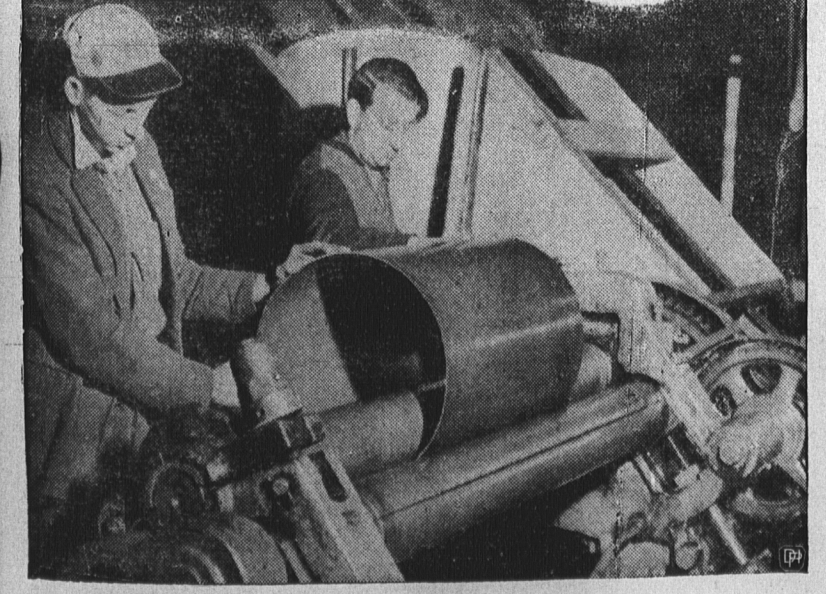
