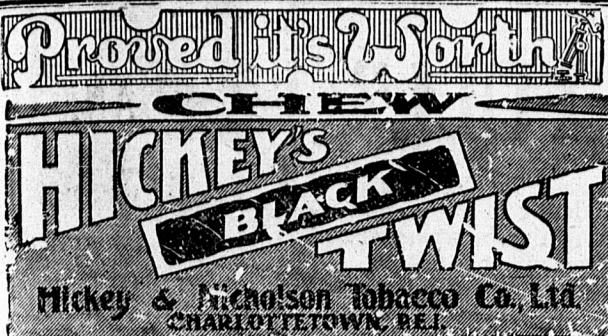

SOLDIERS AND SAILORS VOTES.—Soldiers who have been on active service overseas and also men who have been employed in the Naval Patrol Service beyond the Canadian Territorial Waters are entitled to vote for a Councillor as well as for an Assemblyman in the Electoral District where they reside on the day of the Election; provided that such persons at the time of enlistment were or now are permanent residents of this province. Soldiers and sailors who have enlisted but have not left the shores of Canada and are otherwise qualified as above have a vote for an Assemblyman only.

A BRITISH STUDENT.—In the recently published results of the Medical examinations at Toronto University appears the name of one Prince Edward Island student, Miss Florence Macdonald of Pictou. Miss Macdonald has done exceptional work in Histology and other subjects that include microscopic drawing. She has been offered a position at Harvard in this work of illustrating, where she would work under the famous artist, Prof. Max Brodel. FURTHER PARTICULARS.—The community of Long River is profoundly moved with sorrow over the sad accident which took place on Friday evening. Some young men had gone to the shore in the dusk of the evening to take a refreshing bath in the cool river. Three of them Edward Campbell, David Johnstone and James Andrew Johnston were ready to take the plunge when the sandy edge of the bank gave way under their feet and the whirl pool they had intended to avoid had taken them. Only one of these David Johnstone could swim with live self possession and rare courage the boy of 13 years of age dived to the rescue of his nearly helpless companion Edward Campbell seizing him by the hair of the head he held him till assistance came and hauled ashore. For a time there was little hope that Edward would survive but slowly came back to consciousness and life. In the meantime eager eyes looked for the head of the other James Andrew Johnstone to come to the surface. But in vain all the night saddened hearts watched and grappled for his head. At 8 o'clock in the morning their labours were rewarded and the body was found but a short distance from the scene of the accident. Few young men of his age, so highly respected and so loved as him. He was a joyous and cheerful young man and a social member in the church gatherings. In the blacksmith's forge in which he worked with his father he was known as rarely handy for his age and always obliging and ready to serve. The funeral services were conducted on Sunday afternoon by the Rev. George Miller assisted by Rev. Mr. Neil. Over 180 carriages and 20 automobiles were in the procession. Rarely close an island rural community, and a stronger yearning heavenward for divine comfort. All hearts in silence reaking with tenderness sympathized with the father Mr. Edward Johnstone and his mother and little sister The wreaths of flowers by the school girls and the young men of his own age touched all hearts deeply.
