REVISITS OLD SCENES.—Mr. D. A. McDonald of Boston arrived in Charlottetown yesterday on a holiday after an absence of twenty-nine years. Mr. McDonald was formerly a well-known figure in public life having been a member of the legislature from 1878 to 1882 for Fort Angustus district. Mr. McDonald's business connections necessitated his removal to Boston so in 1888 he sees many changes in his native province and is greatly impressed with the western part of the country through which he has already passed. He does not think he has seen any more fertile farmer's districts in the twenty nine-years he has seen since he left. Mr. McDonald's many friends are pleased to see him once more amongst them looking so well and prosperous. He holds a prominent position in the city of his adoption. He is one of the founders of the Intercolonial Club, the most prominent institution of its kind in the city. He is a past grand chief of the order of Scottish Clans in Massachusetts, a member of the Ancient order of United Workmen, and archivist of the St. Augustine Lyceum. He speaks very highly of the prominent positions taken by Islanders in the New England States, and says the present President of the Intercolonial Club, Mr. Peter Gaudet is an Islander and the next President Mr. Wm. M. Chris, druggist Boston, is also an Islander from Charlottetown.

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 26.—Ten cases of infantile paralysis in Winchester County, thirty-three in Ulster, and others in various parts of the state, making a total of about 100, have stirred up State Health Department authorities. In Green County there have been five cases and two deaths.

DR. HERMAN M. BIGGS, state health commissioner, said tonight that there was no need of alarm at this time. He urged parents, however, to keep their children away from large gatherings, and advised that children be not permitted to become over-fatigued.

"That period of incubation of infantile paralysis," he said, "is usually rather short, less than a week, and so far as is known, it is never more than two weeks. There is no medicinal agent known which has any effect in preventing the appearance of the disease.

While it is a communicable disease under ordinary circumstances it is only slightly so, and usually it is difficult to trace the source of infection in any given case. State health department officials declare the epidemic is centered in Ulster, where thirty-three cases were reported up to this morning. While several cases developed in July, there were twenty-three thus far reported this month.

The disease has also been prevalent in Herkimer County, fourteen cases being reported since the first of this month. Several of these cases have been of the abortive or non-paralysis type.
