## ENDEAVORED TO BUY HELPFUL EVIDENCE

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Aug. 22.—Money for the purchase of signed statements favourable to Herbert Wilson charged with the murder of Herbert Cox, alleged mail robber, who was slain during an attempted jail break, was distributed freely to fellow prisoners, according to the testimony of William Hornbuckle, one of the witnesses at Wilson's trial to-day.

Witness testified that after the shooting Wilson asked him to procure statements from the other prisoners to be used for Wilson's benefit at the trial and paid him various sums, directing him to give the boys whatever they want.

## KANT'S POVERTY

Barring the ten years spent as tutor in private families, Kant passed the whole of his long life in Koenigsberg, where he was born in 1724. During his early tenure of the chair of philosophy his sole emolument consisted of £20 a year, a sack of which every month and sufficient firewood to warm his house in cold weather. On becoming rector of the university only another £20 was added to his yearly stipend, so the greatest of all German philosophers was no much better off than the pastor of Goldersleeve in his latter years. Kant's scanty means were supplemented by an annual allowance of £26 from the privy purse of Frederick the Great.—London Chronicle.

## Ship Picks Up Seaplane Crew

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—Lieut. Hinton, pilot, and "the members of the crew" of the seaplane Sampaolo Corra, which left Nassau in the Bahamas today for Haiti, in its flight from New York to Brazil, were picked up by the U. S. S. Denver at 7 o'clock this evening at latitude 20 north, longitude 74.38 west, according to a wireless message to the Naval Communications Office here tonight, from the Guantanamo Station. All those aboard the craft were understood to be included in the report that the "members of the crew" had been rescued.

Upon the report being received from the cruiser Denver, it was added, a station tug was sent to assist in salvaging the seaplane. No other details were contained in the brief message received here.

## Nearly Victim Of Wood Alcohol

OTTAWA, Aug. 25.—Bootleggers are peddling wood alcohol in the vicinity, and one of their victims nearly succumbed to its effects yesterday afternoon. Nearly blinded, gasping for breath and suffering excruciating pain, Joseph Valente, aged 49, living at 233 Bank street, staggered into St. Luke's Hospital late yesterday afternoon, suffering from the effects of drinking the vile substitute—wood alcohol. If he had delayed seeking medical aid much longer he would have succumbed. He received treatment from one of the house doctors and was able to return home after a few hours.

The man's mouth and throat were terribly burned by the liquid. On leaving the hospital in the evening he was still only able to talk in whispers. Although questioned, he refused to state how he came to drink the wood alcohol. It is thought by the authorities that he had swallowed it in the belief that it was whiskey.

The police are investigating the source of his supply in an attempt to trace the vendor of the poison. Ottawa has been singularly free of wood alcohol poisoning cases in the past in comparison with other cities on the continent.

## RESTRAIN BANKS RELEASING CASH TO DE VALERA

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—A temporary injunction restraining local banks in which are deposited monies collected for the Irish Republican cause from releasing them to Eamon de Valera or any of his agents was signed late today by Supreme Court Justice Burr on application of attorneys representing Michael Collins and other officers of the Irish Free State forces.

It was announced that approximately \$2,300,000 was tied up by the order.

Service of complaint on De Valera and the other defendants was ordered to be made through the insertion of advertisements in newspapers in England and Ireland. Most of the funds involved are said to be deposited with the Guaranty Trust Company and the Harriman National Bank.

The main contention urged against the de Valera custody of the Irish funds, the application for an injunction rests on the fact that Ireland is now a nation; that De Valera is against the present government and is a fugitive and that he is not entitled to the money.

If De Valera or his forces were granted the present funds in United States banks, the Free State representatives contend, it would be devoted to carrying on of further revolution against the present government and prolong needless and unjustifiable civil war in a country which has expressed its preference for the Irish Free State form of Government.

It is further stated in the application that the Irish Free State is prepared to make good the bonds of that nation and that the quickest way to end the present revolt is to deprive De Valera and his aides of funds from this country.

All checks on these funds were deposited in the local banks in De Valera's name up to the time of the signing of the Irish peace treaty. It was said today. The money was placed under the jurisdiction of three trustees Archbishop Fogarty, Irish prelate, Stephen M. O'Mara, Mayor of Limerick and de Valera. They in turn were responsible to the Dail Eireann.

Opponents of De Valera charged that, in spite of their protests, not less than \$250,000 was withdrawn from the Irish funds in this city during the early part of this year.

There was begun some time ago a series of inquiries concerning the exact status of the funds. Those who opposed De Valera charged they could obtain no information from him and that legal proceedings were thus necessitated.

The firm of attorneys representing the Irish Free State officials today deposited with the County Clerk a bond of \$50,000 guaranteeing the good faith of the applicants. The funds involved are represented by \$1,500,000 in securities and \$800,000 in cash.

The granting of the injunction today was said to mark the first time Ireland has been recognized as a nation by a foreign court.

Applications embodied in the one asking for the temporary injunction, seek that the present order of restraint be made permanent and that De Valera be required to give an accounting of the funds in question. Should the defendants fail to interpose an answer to the summons and complaint the application will be automatically granted, officials said.

## Welsh Coal For Toronto \$17.05 Ton

TORONTO, Aug. 25.—The local agent of Welsh colliers called on the city hall today to offer 50,000 tons of Welsh anthracite coal at \$22.00 f.o.b. Montreal. To bring this to Toronto by rail would cost \$3.10 per ton, transportation charges at Montreal would be 75c per ton and the cost of handling in the yards at Toronto would be 60c per ton. This would make the price in Toronto about \$17.05 per ton. Details as to the size of the coal are to be furnished before the city takes any action.

Local dealers are yet unable to determine what the Welsh coal would cost for Ottawa will cost.

Mr. J. J. Heney, Jr., intimated last night that the price in Ottawa would be higher than the Toronto price, but declined to state why. One report is to the effect that hard coal may reach \$20 a ton in Ottawa.

## Five Cable Services With British Isles

LONDON, Aug. 25.—There has been no alteration in the cable service since the Irish irregulars delivered a coup and captured the commercial cable station at Waterville and the Western Union station at Valencia on the southwest coast of Ireland.

Apart from the Imperial Cable Service only four cables between the British Islands and America are working, namely three Western Union wires from Penzance on the Cornwall coast, and one Commercial line from Weston.

The cables touching West Ireland are still cut, and are likely to remain so for some time.

The Imperial cable authorities state that owing to the discontinuance of the deferred service to the United States they are able to give service to Canada without delay.

Operations have not yet been resumed at the Clifden wireless station which was retrieved from the hands of the Irish irregulars last week.

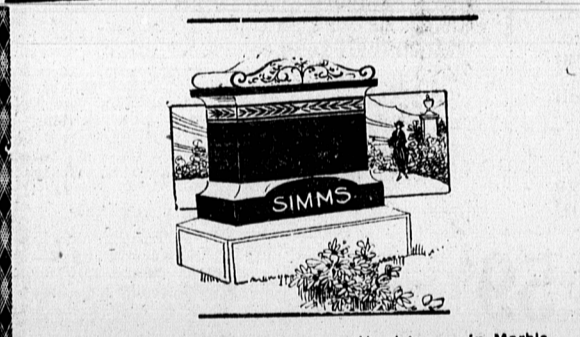
