One of the very noblest things in life is honest labor. We cannot look around us without rejoicing in its bloodless triumphs. any work, and whose fathers and grandfathers before them had never worked. On this the American replied: "We have some of that class of people here but we call them tramps!" The report was well deserved. An idler is little better than a tramp. The law of labor is divine. It is not an accident or a disaster. It is an absolute necessity for the development of the noblest forms and forces of life. It prevails the universe. An angel's wing would tire if long at rest. TWO HUNDRED DENTISTS ARE SENT TO PRISON.

MOSCOW, Jan. 6.—An interesting trial, involving fraud in connection with obtaining dentists' certificates, was brought to a close here today, when two hundred and one Jewish dentists were sent to prison for a year.

Some time recently it was discovered that many Jews in this city had become dentists by some underground means, and an investigation was made. For years previous the Jews could obtain certificates of dentistry by serving a required apprenticeship, but this system was revised by making it necessary to obtain a diploma from the Moscow University. The Jews who held certificates could reside outside of the pale, and the new requirement seriously threatened their chance of gaining the right, diplomas being necessary. The scheme of fraud was then inaugurated, by which Jews could obtain certificates dating before the requirement of a diploma became necessary, but they over-reached themselves and the fraud was uncovered.

Many arrests were made, and a total of five hundred Jewish dentists and those who aided them were accused. This number was reduced, but two hundred and eighty of the Jewish dentists were arraigned in court today.

It took but a short time to convict two hundred and one of the number and the sentence of a year's imprisonment was imposed. The others were acquitted. Nine physicians and officials were given sentences ranging from one to three years for procuring the bogus certificates for the Jews.

THRILLING RESCUE.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Jan. 10.—Captain Burke and the eight members of the crew of the fishing schooner Evelyn were hauled to safety up the steep cliffs at Isle Au Bois Cove by the fisher folk at that hamlet yesterday after the Evelyn had been dashed to pieces on the ledges off shore. The wreck of the Evelyn had left her crew helpless as their boats had been carried away. Hope of reaching shore safely was slight, until a boat, manned by three Au Bois fishermen, put out and reached the Evelyn's side.

When the transfer of the schooner's crew from their wrecked vessel to the small boat had been accomplished, and the boats headed for shore, the wind shifted. The small craft was carried out of its course and was thrown on a narrow shelf of rock at the foot of the cliffs a mile down the coast. The men landed uninjured, but their boat was broken against the ledges. Hemmed in by the perpendicular cliffs on one side and by the pounding seas on the other, the little band seemed without any way of escape. But their fight for life had been watched from shore, and the fisherfolk hurried from the villages to the cliffs above the place where the men were stranded and dropped ropes to the men below, hauling them to safety one by one.

SHIPPING IS DELAYED BY STRIKE OF DOCK MEN.

CALLAO, Peru, Jan. 9.—The shipping industry of this port has been brought to a complete standstill today by a general strike of dock laborers and longshoremen. Many vessels have in consequence left for other Peruvian ports. Efforts are being made to settle the dispute by arbitration.
