FOX NEWS

Interest is being revived in this locality in the fox farming industry now being so successfully carried on in Prince Edward Island, says the Sydney Record.

Some years ago Cape Breton too had her fox farms, but owing to good and sufficient reasons no doubt, those enterprises failed to make their owners rich beyond the dreams of avarice. Among these fox farms was one established some time ago at the Lingan road. The returns did not warrant its continuance and as a result the company was obliged to dispose of the animals. It is stated that some of the foxes on this farm which were purchased by P. E. Island parties for the magnificent sum of \$400 each, were subsequently disposed of by the Dalton people in the Island for amounts that ran into five figures. The Lingan road property is still available, it is understood and retains all the equipment but the foxes.

They are going into the fox farming business in Cape Breton, reports a man with Prince Edward Island. Dr. McPhail, of New York, in Cape Breton and is contracting for material for two more Fox Farms, at Whyocomeg, the already having one there.

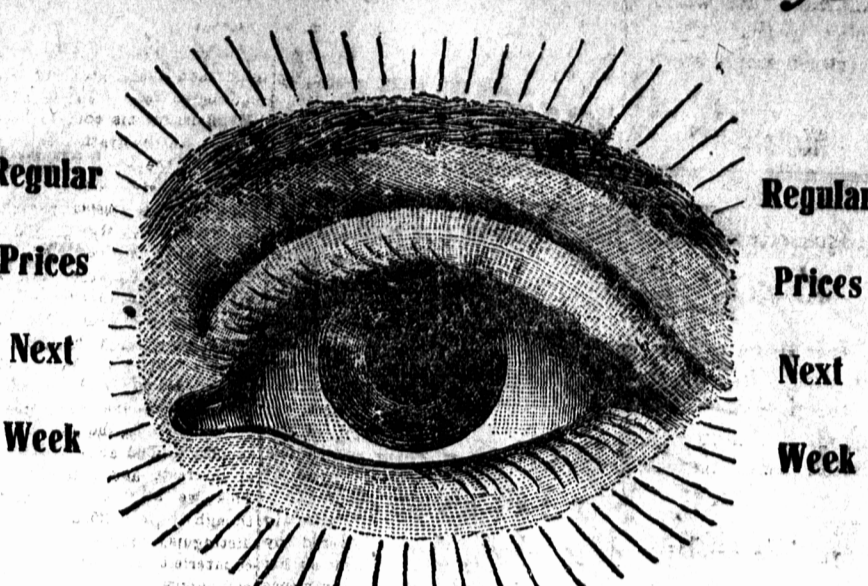
