**The Experts Say**

**OTTAWA, July 26 — SAVORY** lettuce: There is no better time of the year to serve savory lettuce than right now, says a Agriculture Department Consumer Section. Here is their recipe:

Mix six cups of leaf lettuce broken into pieces, a half teaspoon of salt and an eight of a teaspoon of pepper together in a serving bowl. Chop up a bunch of onion and cook them a few minutes in a frying pan. Add a third of a cup of vinegar and boil one minute. Pour this dressing immediately over the lettuce and toss so that the lettuce is thoroughly coated. This will provide six servings. A chopped, hard-boiled egg may be sprinkled over the lettuce just before serving.

The new raids are causing destruction of homes and property and large numbers of London Mayors are being made to relieve consequent distress and suffering.  The Queen's Canadian Fund has sent a total of \$60,000 to the Lord Mayor's National Air Raid Distress Fund, for this purpose.

**BEANS AGAIN:** Now that the navy and other priority users don't need the beans Saturday night, they may again become Baked Beans and Boston Brown Bread Night for hundreds of Canadian families.
