ARGUMENTS OPENED

Arguments on the Report of the Church Union Commission Began Yesterday.

Argument on the report of the Church Union Commission, opened yesterday before Chief Justice Matheson, Justice Hazard and Justice Arsenault, who comprise the Court of Appeal in Equity.

The Commission who submitted their report in the early winter, consisted of Mr. H. J. Palmer, K. C., chairman; Mr. W. E. Bentley, K. C., and Mr. K. M. Martin. This report dealt with about twenty-seven congregational matters having to do with the allocation of church property in this province.

Mr. Hector Molniss, K. C., of Halifax, assisted by Messrs. Whitehead and Thos. Campbell is presenting the argument in behalf of the United Church.

Mr. Donald McKinnon, K. C., is the counsel for the continuing Presbyterian.

Mr. Molniss began his argument when court opened in the morning and continued well into the afternoon session, in which he was followed by Mr. Whitehead, Mr. McKinnon spoke briefly before court adjourned.

Mr. Molniss in the course of the presentation of his argument explained the meaning of the United Church Act—how all general property of the Methodist and Presbyterian congregations passed to the United Church of Canada, but that congregational property of these denominations is still held by some trustees for the benefit of some congregations under the Model Trust Deed which forms part of the Act. He further submitted that under the terms of the amendment passed to the provincial act of 1926, the Commission had no power to take the property of Methodist congregations for Presbyterian minorities, because the amendment allowed property to be taken only from congregations that had divided on the Union question. There were no minorities in the Methodist congregations because all Methodist congregations went into Union without a vote.

Mr. Molniss further pointed out that in practically all cases heard by the Commission, the United Church Congregations had offered to convey to the minority a church building in six cases and in seven cases had offered the minority the right to worship in their church building at such hours as the majority were not using it. Thus in practically all cases the majority had offered to the limit of what they could offer without depriving themselves of a convenient place of worship.

Mr. Whitehead submitted that the West Point case was typical of many with which the Commission had dealt. In that case the majority had offered to the minority the right to worship in the building because if they had complied with the request of the minority and had given them the church building, they would be depriving their own congregation of a convenient place in which to worship. The majority in the Commission in this case had allocated the Presbyterian Church to the minority and the court was requested to alter this award, by giving to the minority the right to worship in the church building at such times as the majority were not using it, instead of the title to it. This was submitted as a solution of the difficulty, whereby both the majority and minority congregation would suffer a minimum degree of hardship.
