THE Halifax Herald has a sensation. It describes how Edward Lively was sent to the Victoria general hospital on Sept. 17, 1901, and how he died in the following month. The Herald says Dr. McLean, Lively's physician, charges that his patient's death was due in part at least to negligence at the hospital. Blood poisoning was the cause of death. In concluding a double-column article on the subject the papers says:—"The Herald, recognizing its duty to the public, with the gravest sense of its responsibility in the matter, now specifically charges that the death of Edward Lively was occasioned by careless and negligent treatment at the Victoria general hospital, and that the government are shielding the persons who have been guilty of neglect of their duties in that institution."

THE London papers announce that the marriage of Charles Holbrook, son of Commander Holbrook R. N. grandson of Sir Thomas Swinerton Dyer to Miss Kathleen Hay Canning, daughter of the late George Canning Esq. R. N. and granddaughter of the late Hon. Edward Palmer chief justice of Prince Edward Island was solemnised on Wednesday afternoon July 20th at St. Peter's Church Cranley Gardens, South Kensington. The chancel was profusely decorated with lilies and palms and an arch of the same was artistically arranged at the gateway. The Rev. S. Swayne performed the ceremony. The bride rode to church in a motor car accompanied by Mr. Hesselwood who gave her away. Digby Goddard performed the duties of best man. The bride wore a gown of white silk with shirred yoke and trimmings of quaint true lover knots. On the bodice were drappings of mechin lace and tastefully arranged orange blossoms, her ornaments were pearls and diamonds the gift of the groom, she carried an exquisite bouquet of white roses, carnations and lilies of the valley. Following the bride were two tiny train bearers Miss Vera Yates and Master Stanley Holbrook attired in suits of ivory silk. The bridesmaids Misses Beatrice and Gladys Canning wore dresses of white mousseline de soie over soft silk skirts trimmed with valenciennes lace, draped bodies of the same with lace insertion and high waists bands and sleeve ribbons of soft flowered silk in blended colors of orange, apricot and mauve, hats to match and shower bouquets of shaded yellow roses. The service was fully choral and the hymns chosen by the bride were "The voice that breathed o'er Eden" "Perfect Love" and "Now thank we all our God." Mrs. Canning, mother of the bride, wore a handsome gown of flowered chiffon over pale blue silk with hat to match. Mrs. Holbrook, mother of the groom, wore black embroidered mousseline de soie over lavender silk, shower bouquet of purple and white orchids. REV. D. MCGILLIVRAY, missionary of the Presbyterian church of Canada, in Shanghai, has been visiting his native land and is now on his way to China. He told at a meeting in Winnipeg that a couple of educated Shanghai ladies being asked what work of fiction if translated into Chinese would do most good to the people the answer was that Ralph Connor's Black Rock would be most beneficial. Canada's popular author's fame is world-wide.

THE Messrs Fawcett, of Upper Sackville, have done a good business this year in handling strawberries. The season was not an unfavorable one, and the crop was quite up to the average. W. B. Fawcett informed a representative of this paper yesterday that he and his brother had exported about 22,000 boxes during this season. He had raised 10,000 boxes on his own farm and his brother Chase, the other six thousand. They exported to Amherst, Moncton and Springhill regularly. They also sent a considerable quantity to Sydney and Halifax, and they found a ready sale for the fruit in Montreal.—Post.

CHARGES of infraction of the rules of the Methodist church have been made against Rev. John Armstrong, superintendent minister of that church, residing in Hochelaga, Montreal, arising out of the celebration of the marriage ceremony in a shop window some months ago, in which that gentleman participated. The matter aroused much adverse comment at the time, and the thing was severely denounced by both Roman Catholic and Protestant clergy, as well as by the press. No action was taken by the Methodist body, owing to the absence of the chairman of the district, Rev. M. Taylor, but steps have now been taken and as soon as that matter will be pressed to a conclusion.
