Effective Monday, January 2nd, 1928, the Canadian National Railways announce that the present double service between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland will be discontinued, and in place thereof the following service will be inaugurated.

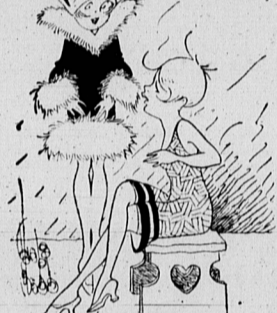

Outbreak Of Foot And Mouth Disease

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Dec. 28.—Twenty-six outbreaks of foot and mouth disease in six widely distributed centres of infection has necessitated declaration of a "standstill" area by the ministry of Agriculture. The effect of the declaration is to prohibit movement of cattle, sheep, pigs and goats in the area without a license.

The movement from the "standstill" area to a free area is forbidden and markets will be strictly regulated. The "standstill" area covers practically the whole of the midlands and parts of Yorkshire and Lancashire.

Arms Committee Has Been Abolished

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 28.—The standing small arms committee of the Canadian militia has been abolished and in its place a more comprehensive body has been formed. The old committee just dealt with militia affairs but the new one, which will be called the standing arms committee, will include all arms of the service. It will consist of a chairman, five members and a secretary appointed by the Minister of National Defense from Officers of the naval, military and air forces of Canada in permanent, naval, military or air force employment. Associated members may also be appointed by the minister.

Drury May Get Government Post

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Dec. 28.—The possibility of Hon. E. C. Drury, taking an active post under the government is being discussed in Ottawa and his name is being mentioned in connection with both the national advisory board on the St. Lawrence waterways and the international joint waterways commission. Both these appointments are in the hands of the prime minister, who is proverbially silent on such matters. It is known, however, that Mr. Drury is persona grata with the administration and favorably considered by the federal cabinet ministers from Ontario.

With The Boxers

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—While uncertainty continues to shadow the Jack Sharkey-Tom Heeney heavyweight battle set for January 13, at Madison Square Garden, Dr. W. G. Fralick, Sharkey's physician, stated today that a definite decision on the Boston boxer's condition would be made this week.

At the present time, Sharkey has evidenced no trouble with his injured left hand in banging the punching bag, but he has done no sparring.

Although Jack Delaney of Bridgeport, Conn., has been put forward as a possible substitute for Sharkey, there is question of Heeney's handlers agreeing to such a match.

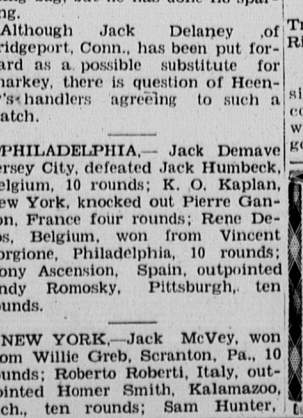

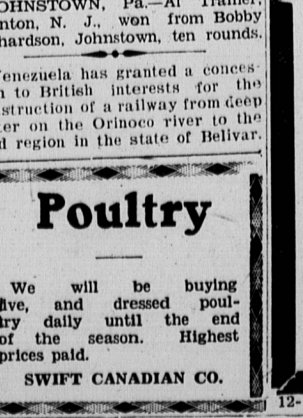

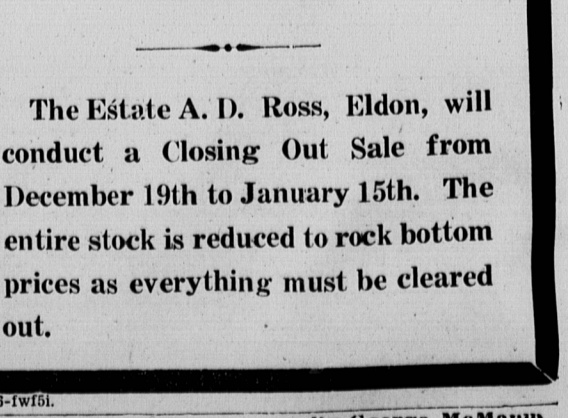
