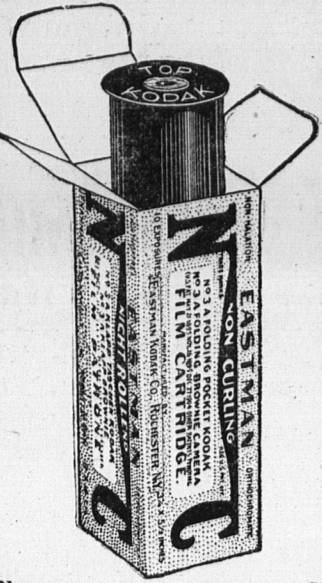

THE EXHIBITION—Not a little credit for the success of the recent Provincial Exhibition of Prince Edward Island is due to the judges, who so impartially and skillfully considered the vast number of exhibits placed before them; and the exhibitors all, without a single exception, agree that never have they been so thoroughly pleased and satisfied, so far as the judging was concerned, as on the present occasion. They speak in the highest terms of the judges, who exerted every endeavor to do full and complete justice by all. On Saturday a Guardian reporter had the pleasure of interviewing and ascertaining their impressions in regard to the Exhibition and Prince Edward Island generally. They all have nothing but compliments for the Island Province, which they think is "a remarkably pretty place, with excellent soil and splendid crops." Mr. M. Greenlees, of Bowmanville, Durham County, Ontario, judged the heavy horses; Mr. Wm. Jones, Oxford, Ont., judged the swine; and Mr. P. D. McArthur, Howick, Quebec, the Ayreshires. Mr. Greenlees expressed surprise with the quality of the horses here, some of which were particularly good and he thought Baron Kelvin "a great horse, whose stock will be a credit to the Island." Mr. Greenlees said he liked the Island very much, "having seen nothing so much easier and pleasanter." Mr. P. D. McArthur judged the Ayreshires, Jerseys, Guernseys and Ayshire breeds. He thought the quality was quite up to the standard. He thought a great deal of Milkmaid 7th, the holder of the Canadian record, and said that she was doing what a great many other cows were not,—reproducing in her offspring, individuals of prime merit. He said that the Jerseys were considerably better than those he saw last year and fit for any show ring. In regard to Holsteins, he referred particularly to an especially good herd shown by Messrs. Lee and Clarke, whose aged bull he described as "one of the crack bulls in Canada, and is impressing his characteristics on his offspring, which makes him valuable not only as a show bull but as a breeding animal." The exhibits, he thought, were of excellent quality, and highly creditable to Prince Edward Island. Mr. McArthur said that in the poultry industry, Prince Edward Island is the banner Province of Canada.

THE CHILDREN'S EXCURSION—Inspector Cain, who was in the city in connection with the Teacher's Association Conference, called at the Guardian office on Saturday and expressed his satisfaction with the success of the recent excursion of school children from Inspector Adams and his own districts to the Experimental Farm. Everything, he said, went without a hitch, and the teachers and organizers were greatly indebted to the railway officials in Charlottetown, Tracadie, Mount Stewart, Peakes, Carleton Place, and Georgetown, and the conductors and assistants on the train for the assistance they gave—especially Conductor Ferguson. The directors of the Experimental Station and his staff also deserve the thanks of the promoters for the hearty welcome and attention they gave. Professor Reek was likewise solicitous for the children's comfort and their thanks are tendered him.

THE BULGARIANS WANT TO RETURN

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 24.—What to do with Bulgarians in Canada is a problem just now giving some both to the government. There are not a great many of them the last census placed the number at something over 1,500, but there has been considerable immigration since.

Now that Bulgaria is getting into the war the reservists in Canada want to get back. A call to them presumably has been made. If they were of a nationality with which Great Britain is at war, their exit would be stopped. The difficulty arises from the fact that though everything indicates that Bulgaria has joined cause with the Huns, there is no definite declaration to that effect. Consequently reservists seeking to re-join cannot be held up as freely as they are yet being interned.

As far as can be learned few, if any, have gone, and the question of what to do about it is before the government.

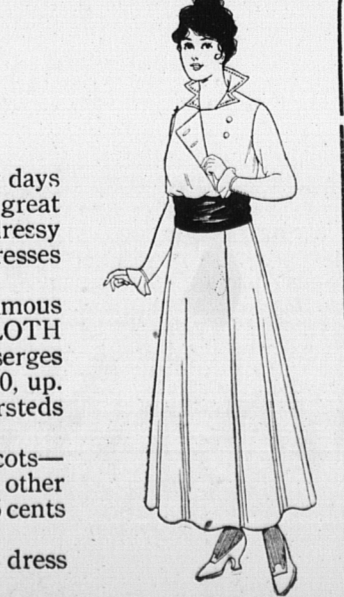
