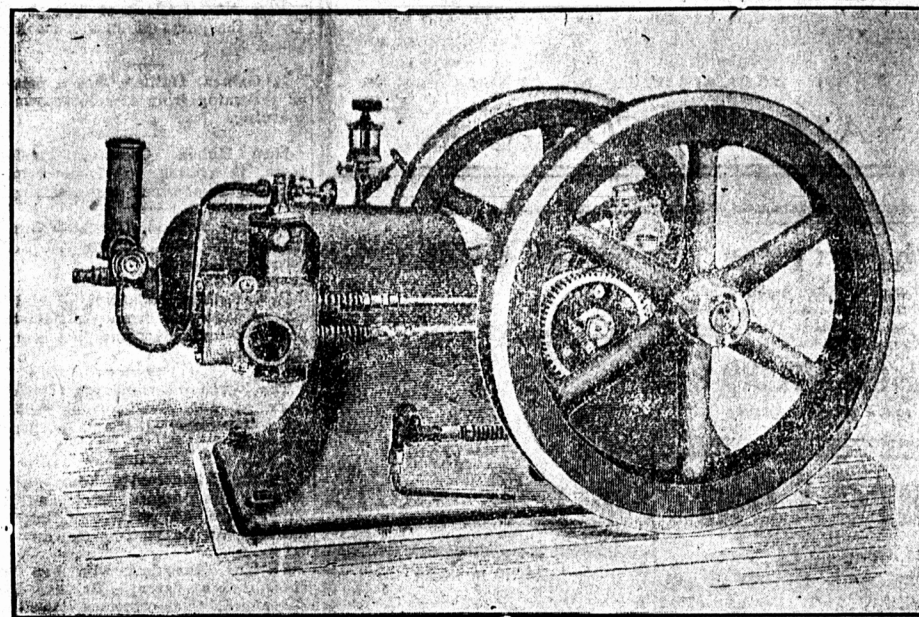

TWO NEW YORK POLICEMEN INDICTED.

Judge Mulquon gave them until Wednesday to change their plea if they desired.

STRANGE EXPERIENCE OF A YOUNG LAD.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 23—The Sussex Record says that during the camp a member of the R.C.R., from Halifax showed deep interest in Pearson Campbell, the thirteen year old son of Sergt. D.L. Campbell, of the 74th Regiment, and invited him to Halifax promising him a good time. After declining several times the parents let him go. Now he is home with a strange story to tell. He says that his best met him at the station and took him to one of the forts on McNab's Island. There the boy was introduced as a bugler and put to work about the tents of the men. The many entertainments that were to have been his did not materialize. He was closely guarded and letters addressed to him by his mother and other members of the Campbell family never reached him. For some six weeks he was subjected to this kind of treatment until action by Colonel Humphrey took the matter up and saw that he was released. Money sent to the boy by his parents was never given to him, and he was as helpless as if he had been marooned. It is understood that the soldier was disciplined for his part in the matter. It seems that another boy, a son of one of the prominent residents of Sussex was also invited by the same man to go to Halifax with him but the hospitality was declined.
