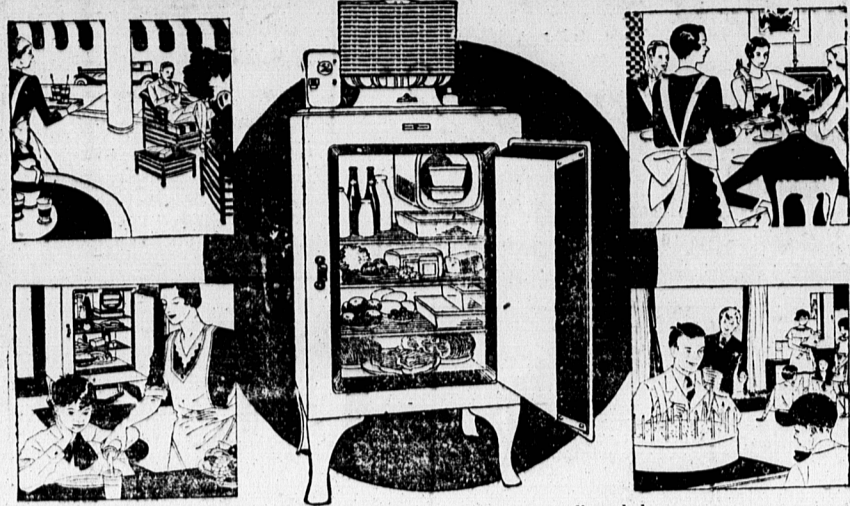

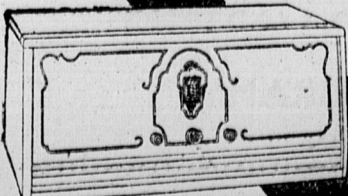

I. O. D. E. Overseas Scholarships Are Announced

TORONTO, Dec. 11.—Announcement was made here today by the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire of the award of nine overseas scholarships to students or graduates of various Canadian Universities under the provisions made by the order for these annual awards. The scholarships provide \$1,400 for each student to cover expenses during post graduate work in British Universities.

The awards this year include the following: New Brunswick, George Mersereau, B. A., of the University of New Brunswick. His father was wounded overseas. His grandfather and uncle also served in the Great War.

Nova Scotia—Margaret Ellis, B. A., of Dalhousie. Her father served with the Royal Engineers of Halifax. She proposes to take post graduate work in history, University of London.

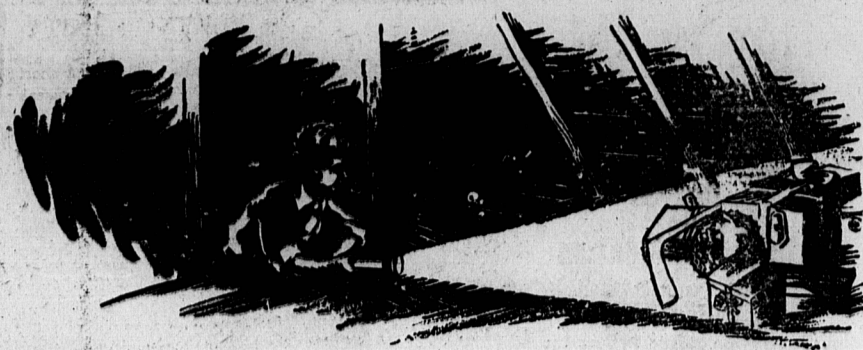
Prince Edward Island—Stewart MacNutt, of Kings College, Halifax, who expects to take his post graduate work at Oxford or at the London School of Economics.

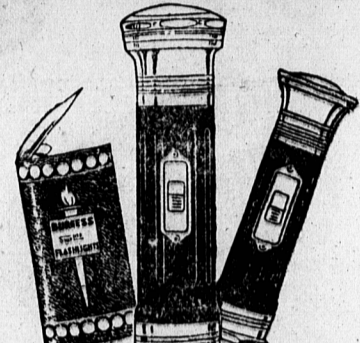
