Cochrane Disappointed Over Routing Line

OTTAWA, April 16-(By The Canadian Press)-Resuming the discussion of the item in the estimates of the Department of Trade and Commerce for \$2,400,000 for the Canada grain act, in the evening J. A. Bradette, (Lib., Temiskaming, North) declared that the citizens of Cochrane have been very sadly disillusioned when they thought Cochrane was going to be on the route for trans Canada grain and cattle traffic. Due to "discriminatory freight rates," Cochrane, which was the logical point to be on the main route, had been excluded.

If Canadian grain were routed over the National trans-continental line to the eastern Canada ports, instead of going through United States Atlantic ports, there would be no unemployment in his constituency, Mr. Bradette said. He would make no complaint, he said, if Canadian grain was not going through the United States. But he had information to show that fifty per cent of Canada's grain exports went through United States ports. To a question by John Wallace, (Lib., South Battleford), the Minister of Trade and Commerce stated that there were about 847 employees permanently in the service of the board of grain commissioners, under control of the civil service commission and receiving about \$1,908,000 per year in salaries. In addition there were about 380 temporary employees.

Two Babies Die From Suffocation

TORONTO, Ont., April 16 - (By The Canadian Press)-Within a few minutes of each other, two babies died from suffocation in Toronto today, and in both houses bed-clothes were responsible.

Three-months-old Margaret Gallagher was placed in her crib for a nap while her mother carried out the daily house work. Mrs. Gallagher found the child hidden under the bed-clothes, dead.

At almost the same time, Mrs. C. H. Ireland had left Lucile, aged four months, asleep in her crib, the youngster pulled the bed clothes over her face and was dead when her mother found her a few minutes later.

N. B. By-election Probably in June

OTTAWA, April 16-(By The Canadian Press)-Rumors in the capital last night are that the date for the by-election in Royal, N. B., will be set shortly. Reports are that Monday, June 13, may be named as nomination day and June 20 as polling day.

The vacancy in Royal was created by the voluntary resignation on Tuesday last of Hon. George B. Jones, former Conservative Minister of Labor. Mr. Jones resigned his seat in the House of Commons upon learning that an infraction of the House of Commons Act had occurred by reason of Jones Bros., Apohouk, N. B., having furnished relief supplies to destitute Indians on orders from the government director of medical services.

The firm is unincorporated, but if it had been incorporated the provisions of the act would not apply. The store is not managed by Mr. Jones personally. Goods supplied to the needy Indians amounted to less than \$700 in value during a period of eighteen months. Mr. Jones had definitely announced that he will return to New Brunswick immediately and seek vindication of his action at the by-election. He will probably leave for his home on Sunday or Monday, and Maritime Conservative members are planning to give him a send-off. In the 1930 general election, Mr. Jones was elected by a majority of 2,924 in a straight party fight.

Little enthusiasm has ever been shown over the new status conferred upon

Newfoundland by the Statute of Westminster. In fact, doubts have been expressed whether it was to the country's advantage at this stage of development to be left to paddle her own canoe. The Dragon's arrival is welcomed, inasmuch as it indicates that the strong arm of Britain is still at Newfoundland's service should need for that assistance arise."

New Interest In U. S. Turf

CHICAGO, Ills., April 16-Australia's lightning bolt, Phar Lap, has blazed a rainbow over the United States turf world. Just when everything looked dark for almost every racetrack after a losing winter season, south and west, the wonder horse from down under has arrived to give the sport of kings a new thrill. "I cannot think of any better possible break to American racing than the invasion of Phar Lap," said the 71-years-old Colonel Matt Winn, direction genius of the Kentucky Derby for the last 33 years. "The invasion of Phar Lap and his victory in the Agua Caliente Handicap has stirred the imagination of every race fan and given us all renewed enthusiasm for a bigger and better turf year. "They tell me he really is a great horse. He must be to stand that long 10,000 mile ride over the Pacific and come out as sound as a dollar."

Colonel Winn has started plans for staging a big match race for Phar Lap, and some of the best stake runners in June at Washington Park, for a purse of \$25,000 or \$50,000, depending upon the thorough-bred chosen to oppose the big red horse. It may be the winner of the Kentucky Derby on May 7 or the winner of the \$50,000 Preakness, the winner of the American Derby or Twenty Grand or Mate, or all of them. The best thoroughbreds in racing will be chosen as Phar Lap's opponents. Colonel Winn is a specialist in producing match races and international contests and knows the values of these transactions.

No Revision of Company Act

(By the Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., April 16-Far-reaching changes in laws governing the incorporation of companies were suggested in the Senate today by George Lynch-Staunton, Hamilton, Ont. Taking objection to issues of no-par value stock, he advocated limiting a company to one class of shares. To preclude financiers and promoters from securing control of an industry, it was suggested that a company be prohibited from buying shares in another company in the same business.

A dominion act, laying down the principles of company incorporation and approved by the provinces, was proposed by Senator Lynch-Staunton. The provinces then would issue charters in conformity with the Dominion Act. The Government, said Senator Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader in the upper house, did not contemplate a revision of the companies act at the present time. Senator Lynch-Staunton referred had been visiting in Prince Edward Island, arrived home this morning.

Sir T. White Says Budget Praiseworthy

TORONTO, April 16-Sir Thomas White, wartime finance minister, declares Hon. E. N. Rhodes' address "a very able and impressive budget presentation." "The statement of the minister as to the financial position of Canada is remarkably clear and comprehensive," Sir Thomas said to The Telegram. "Too much credit cannot be given the Government for the measures taken during the past year in successfully dealing with the difficult exchange situation with which the Dominion and the provinces were confronted in meeting their obligations payable in New York funds -that is to say in gold and thus upholding the financial integrity and prestige of Canada in the eyes of the outside world."

"Our credit is of the utmost national importance, and for its continued maintenance a balanced budget is essential. The Minister had a very difficult situation to deal with and heavily increased taxation, unpleasant as it is, was inevitable, we must all bear as cheerfully as we can the burden of whatever taxation measures are necessary to tide us over this very trying period through which Canada, in common with the rest of the world, is passing."

"The dilemma of all governments today is that while on the one hand retrenchment of expenditures is imperatively called for by financial exigency, the very act of such retrenchment causes further unemployment, for the relief of which Governments must find funds. In good times, and especially in boom periods, public opinion exercised a wholesome check upon expenditures, and increase of public debts, we should not have to sustain the burden of ever increasing taxation in the periods of depression, which inevitably follow. But on the contrary, it is in periods when times are good and credit in abundant supply that public opinion encourages and even demands almost unlimited public expenditures of borrowed funds."

"I think the Minister discharged his duty to the government and the country with great courage and good judgment. I am speaking generally with regard to his taxation proposals, not having had time to examine them carefully in detail."
