MR. MARIO CAPPELLI

Mario Cappelli, world famous tenor, who is engaged to appear in opera in Italy, France and Spain in 1926-27, is in the city and has been an interested visitor to the beauty spots of the Province.

Mr. Cappelli has consented to stay over the week end here and give a recital in Zion Church tomorrow, Sunday evening, at 8:30 to which the public are cordially invited.

There is no admission but a silver collection will be taken. This remarkable tenor is not simply a singer, but an artist. Not merely a man, but a personality.

He was born in America of Italian parents, gifted with an extraordinary tenor voice of the best Italian character, developed to the highest degree by faithful training and study under the instruction of several eminent vocal experts.

From childhood Cappelli had a natural talent for singing. He was taken to Italy at the age of three years; at the age of eight he could sing many operatic airs in a boyish fashion; at the age of ten he won a prize in the Musical Academy of Caserta for singing Italian Folk Songs. Later he returned to America, where he attended school. It was his father's wish that he should study medicine.

Although proud of his son's musical talent, he objected to music as a profession. Cappelli has become one of the greatest tenors of today. He is a typical American young man, lover of all sports. He is the only Latin descendent in the world who can sing with the purest English diction. He loves Negro Folk Songs, and frequently goes down South to study the native characters for those beautiful songs. He is the only tenor since the lamented Caruso who makes a study of Italian Folk Lore Songs, which are loved the world over.

It will be quite a concession to have an opportunity to hear this gifted singer tomorrow in Zion Church.

Must Guard Nurses From Infectious Patients

LONDON, England, July 9.—The danger of infection from nurses attending puerperal fever cases (septic cases) was emphasized by a coroner. During the past 6 months in connection with the Kingston nursing home or its association nurses, seven women had died and 24 hours quarantines was not enough for nurses. All the cases had been investigated had followed each other in such a way that there was no doubt that the infection was carried to the patients by the same nurse. It was not his duty to inquire into conditions at the nursing home, but he felt that he would be neglecting his duty if he did not say that he thought the whole thing was very unsatisfactory.
