There was a good attendance of our most up-to-date and successful agriculturists.

ELECTRIC LOCOMOTIVES.

ON THE GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY.

When the Canadian Westinghouse Company finish their work on the famous St. Clair tunnel at Sarnia, this subterranean passage will be an object less in some of the modern uses of electricity.
