POTATO CROP FORECAST—An error occurred in the forecast of the potato yield for 1926 published in the Dept. of Agriculture's Fruit and Vegetable Crops summary. The forecast read 48,281,000, cwt. instead of 43,281,000, cwt. Messrs. R. E. Mutch and Co., brought this to the attention of the chief of Markets Extension Division, Ottawa, and the regular issue of the fruit and vegetable Crop Report, which will be out in a few days, will contain the correct figures.

VISITING CLERGYMAN RETURNS—The Rev. Charles P. Trainor, Fall River, who was the guest of the Rev. Dr. P. Croken, Fort Augustus, on Sunday last, sang High Mass and preached an eloquent sermon in St. Patrick's Church. Father Charlie is a son of the late Francis and Mrs. Trainor, Fall River, and a grandson of the late Mr. Patrick Trainor, Auburn, He is a graduate of St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, Catholic University, Washington, and St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore. For the last two years he has been doing mission work in the vicinity of San Francisco, Oakland, and other cities in Northern California. He is a pleasing conversationalist, and, in an interview, described in a delightful manner the many beautiful places where he had been, the customs of the charming people whom he had met, and the crop and plant life in that wonderful land in most perpetual summer. Father Charlie was accompanied by his brother, Mr. John Trainor and his sisters, Misses Elizabeth and Adelaide, left on their Tuesday morning after spending a few weeks very pleasantly visiting friends in Charlottetown, and at Kinkora, Auburn, and Iona.

What are we fighting in this election? Clean government first. Can there be any objection to this? We want our country's affairs handled by men clean and above reproach? Is there anything wrong in this? Next, we want to give our own people—our own sons and daughters—the first fruits of this glorious standing they owe to other peoples and countries. Why put up a kick against this? The King combination wants to handle our whole business over to the United States. Conservatives refuse to do this.

Liberal air candles are plentiful. They see, or pretend to see another King government at Ottawa. But they are not quite confident in the West here. Mr. King's speeches out Quebec, and are taking his prairie promises a little too seriously. To offset this discontent the Liberal leader is making a frenzied effort to ally their wrath in one of his old routes he addresses, within a few hours. But the murmuring still continue. Quebec is getting tired of King and his grasping Progressive masters.

When Hon. Ernest Lapointe complained of the Louet charges, Premier Meighen ordered an immediate judicial enquiry, in which Mr. Lapointe was acquitted. Mr. Lapointe's return for this fair play is the slander, at Edmundston, N.B., that "Canada today had no government but was ruled under the dictatorship of a single man." Why this glaring misrepresentation, a much fuller one than the MacKenzie King remnant, all properly sworn in, and appealing in the legal way, as all Ministers must, for the approval of the people. Couldn't Mr. LaPointe be honest and tell the bare truth?

It was Hon. Mr. Dunning's argument that evil can be found in all parties, and even in all churches. While there is truth in this, isn't it something of a marvel, that in the customs probe, which was not limited in extent of its enquiry, there was not one member of a Conservative Government implicated in any fraud or smuggling transaction by any of the evidence before the Commission. And it was not because the Liberals were not on their job; they were after Conservative scapals if they could have them.

Mr. MacKenzie King is coming. Since we last met him he may have learned what "Maritime Rights" are and, without a doubt, he will have a bundle of promises along the line of reform. Perhaps he may tell us of the Royal Commission, and promise to take their report, as a "chart" to guide him to the waste basket.

The Markets MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 27.—The export trade in Canadiana grain on the Montreal market today was quiet. The market rather more active with no change in prices to note. On account of the continued weakness in the Winnipeg cash wheat situation, a weaker feeling prevailed in the local market for spring wheat grades of flour and prices were reduced ten cents per barrel. The local and export trade was fair. Prices for winter wheat grades were limited and prices were inclined to be easier. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 32 1/2 to 32 3/4 c per pound. The cheese market was unchanged. The egg market was active and firm. The receipts were 1,175 cases. The enquiry for butter was limited and prices were inclined to be easier. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 32 1/2 to 32 3/4 c per pound. The volume of business transacted was small. Western grades were quoted at 17 1/2 to 17 3/4 c, and eastern grades at 17 1/2 to 17 3/4 c per pound. The volume of business done in beans was moderate and prices were unchanged. Clear lots of choice white handpick and smaller quantities at \$2.25 per bushel, and smaller quantities at \$2.35 per bushel.

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Campaign Gems

The Liberal press is whining over the nature of the present campaign. The people of Canada are a jury, and the King ministry is before them on trial. It is never pleasant to a clean jury to listen to the nauseating details brought before them in evidence. But, because of this sensitive nature, must the truth be suppressed, and the guilty one allowed to escape? If the political culprits, now facing condemnation, had of kept themselves and their records clean, then we would have all escaped those distasteful disclosures.

And what about the Liberal press's scurrility? Isn't it an adept at misrepresentation? How many hundreds of times has it accused the Conservatives' policy to be one of "High Protection." Where does it get its warrant for this scorching? Never in all the career of Hon. Meighen did it hear, or read from his utterance, a single word to justify or give a shadow of support to this deliberate untruth. And yet the Liberal press has never yet a sufficient protection to our farm products and manufactured goods to preserve them from foreign exploitation and destruction.
