### That Body of Yours

#### THE SLUGGISH LIVER

It is said that none of the recent graduates in medicine have ever heard of a bilious attack—that there is no such ailment. Our older physicians know what has always been called a bilious attack and the patient likewise knows just how badly he feels when headache, nausea and vomiting and perhaps a slight jaundice occur. These symptoms may be due to an obstruction or partial obstruction of the tubes carrying the bile from the liver or from the gall bladder. Gall-stones may or may not be present. Some indigestible food or infection may be the underlying cause.

The ailment known to older physicians as a "sluggish liver" is now not mentioned by this name by professors of medicine, yet it is estimated that about two of every three adults suffer with it to some extent. It likewise causes a feeling of tiredness, lack of appetite, depression, indigestion, and constipation.

That many suffer with a sluggishness or slowness of the liver is now known by various tests. One of the important duties of the liver is to filter or clear the blood of poisons or other substances and also to take up from the blood sugar in a form for storage or other purposes. A liver that is doing its work properly will remove a definite amount of this type of sugar—levulose or fructose (fruit sugar)—within a definite time, according to the size or weight of the individual. Four French physicians, Drs. Giviere, Bernon and Moreau, in Medical Press, Paris, suggest a new test for hepatic (liver) insufficiency.

In fasting persons no levulose can be detected in the blood. After taking levulose, the levulose appears in the blood at the end of twenty or thirty minutes and the greatest amount is found in the blood by the end of the first hour. This is in the individual with a normal or healthy liver. However, in cases of liver insufficiency—slowness or sluggishness—the amount of levulose in the blood at the end of the first hour may be four or five times as much as in those with a normal liver as the liver is so slow or sluggish in removing it.
