Russian apologues to Norway and Sweden for trespasses on their territory committed by Russian fighting aircraft will bring a measure of relief to the tension which has prevailed in the Scandinavian sector of Europe since the Red Army launched its attack on Finland. The Moscow authorities said the Soviet fliers, engaged in the Finnish operations, accidentally flew past the borders of Norway and Sweden owing to bad weather. The gesture from Moscow, a more generous concession to the polite usage of diplomacy than has been customary in that quarter recently, may mean much or little.
