Dempsey Thinks Wills Would Be Easy Mark

CHAMPION HAS STATED BLACK PANTHER WOULD BE SOFTER THAN FULTON

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Jack Dempsey has for some time treated with disdain any reference to a match with Harry Wills. He has stated that Wills was "soft," meaning, of course, as an opponent. He went so far as to say that the "black panther" would be easier to whip than Fred Fulton.

That was the unkindest cut of all—a regular opponent. Fulton was the stuffed man of the ring. Talk about men with the white feather and those who carry the yellow around with them! Fulton, when he stepped into the ring, was clothed with all the hues of the rainbow.

Some years ago "Porky" Flynn trounced Fulton good and plenty at New Orleans. Porky as a fighter, was a dray horse—tumbling, slow and oh, so deliberate. He usually sent a letter to his opponent long before he struck a blow. But he could hit—a whale of a punch. Porky hit Fulton two punches in the stomach—and that practically ended the fight. Fulton claimed a foul. He was told to go on and fight. All he did was to hold on.

That's unkind on the part of Dempsey to belittle Wills to such an extent as to place him below Fulton in the scale of fighters. It wouldn't be necessary for Wills to have his hair cut to prepare for a fight with Fulton. It's a matter of record how he trounced Fred in three rounds in 1920. Harry at that time was a real, honest to goodness fighter. He has been practically away from the game for a long time. The few fights that he has had the last two years have been against men that lived up to the Dempsey stigma—soft.

It is possible that Dempsey has changed his views regarding Wills as an opponent as a result of the ill-advised action of Paddy Mullins in trying to stop the Dempsey-Firpo bout? Up to that time Dempsey thought Wills was a good opponent—declared he was the most logical contender. Jack made friends by not drawing the color line. Then Mullins, manager of Wills, upset the applicant by trying to force Dempsey to fight Wills before he faced Firpo.

Johnson's Opinion Of His Prowess

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Jack Johnson has returned to business. He is running a cabaret in New York's famous black belt region. And he isn't through fighting either. Jack says he fights now for the pleasure of it, however.

"The world's heavyweight championship brought me a lot of trouble," says Jack. "Now it is just a box." "I am forty-five years old. But then I was forty-five mighty light years. I would like to box Mr. Dempsey for about six rounds to decide no decision. Mah, how I could show what kind of a champion he is!

"And Firpo, lawdy, lawdy, what I wouldn't do to Firpo. But I guess Jack ain't never goin' to get them chances. I see a business man now. Boxes a little on the side, jes' to keep in shape.

"But Mah gracious, wouldn't I jes' like to meet Dempsey and Firpo."

Father of Dempsey Arrested on Liquor Charge In Utah

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah., Dec. 28.—Hiram Dempsey, father of Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight boxing champion, is free today on bonds of \$300 after arrest on a charge of violating the prohibition laws. The elder Dempsey was arrested in a local cafe last night by a policeman who confiscated a flask from which Dempsey is said to have been pouring for highballs. A young woman also was taken into custody but she was released and police declined to give her name.

The police today said that it had not been decided what to do in the Dempsey case but that it was possible Federal officials would prosecute.

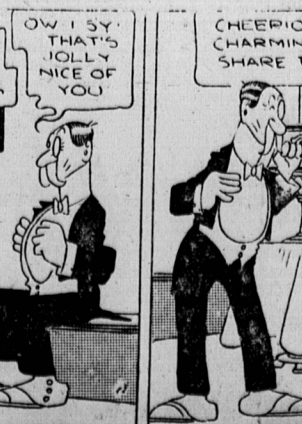
SKIPPER A DUTCH WORD

Our word "ship" is a variety of the Dutch "schip." In old days English people called the sailor the "shipman," whilst in Holland the mariner was called the "schipper," or, as we pronounce it, the skipper. Since there could be only one sailor in command, the Shipman or the Skipper, gradually came to mean the Master Mariner. In the days when New York and Capetown were Dutch colonies they were the greatest sea races. Blake and Cloudesley Shovel swept their fleets off the seas; but they left their word skipper in our sea terms to remind us of their ancient glory.

GRILLED OYSTERS

Drain and dry as many freshly opened oysters as are needed, then lay them on a very fine grid buttered on both sides. Broil the oysters delicately, then lay them on buttered toast and pour over them rather thick and richly made drawn butter. Sprinkle the tops with a few well-washed capers. Place an olive stuffed with red pepper in the centre of each portion. With coffee and some sort of sweet dish, this makes a very satisfactory supper.

U. N. B. Squad Won From Boston Team

NEW BRUNSWICK COLLEGE TEAM OUTCLASSED BOSTON COLLEGE AND WON OUT BY 3 0 1 SCORE.

BOSTON, Dec. 28.—The University of New Brunswick hockey team defeated Boston College here last night 3 to 1. The Canadian team outclassed the Boston team and inspired in the local a desperate effort in the final period to wrest victory from defeat by playing a five-man offense.

The first goal of the game was scored by Richards of U. N. B. in the first period, with ten seconds to go. Foley, of the Bostonians, evaded the score in the second period when he knocked the puck into the net from a scrimmage in front of the visitors' goal, two minutes after play started. Bidlake of U. N. B.'s net man was kept busy and played a stellar game.

The Canadians added two more to their scoring in the third period. Reid scoring in eight minutes and sixteen seconds, and Fleet in fourteen minutes and thirty seconds.

Fitzgerald, local goal keeper, was put off the ice for the rest of the game when he fell on the ice and stopped a shot after three New Brunswick players had carried the puck down the ice. The line up:

CHICAGO, December 28.—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, heavyweight wrestling champion, has accepted terms and conditions for a match with Taro Myaki, claimant of Japan's heavyweight championship, to be held here New Year's night. Their proprietors either retire with a fine bank balance or haunt the corridors of the bankruptcy court. It's all a matter of luck—and personality.

A dance club which is lucky enough to find immediate popularity makes amazing profits. \$300,000 in eleven months, \$10,000 in a single week—these are actual figures, impossible though they may sound. And on top of this there is always the chance of selling it for ten times its purchase if the proprietor is clever enough to sell just at the right moment. Lavishly decorated clubs, with

HOW ANIMALS SLEEP

While wild horses and horses running at grass spend a good deal of their time in lying down, horses kept in stables, especially if they are tied up, two in five entirely refuse to lie down and live always on their feet.

Yet a horse can sleep quite comfortably in a standing position. If you watch it doing so you will notice that it rests one leg at a time, depending upon the other three to sustain the weight of its body.

In this respect the elephant resembles the horse. An elephant wild in the jungle usually lies down to sleep, but an elephant in captivity sleeps standing up. In spite of its capacity for hard work an elephant seems to require very little sleep, for it seldom sleeps for more than four or five hours during the night. Its usual hours for rest are from ten to twelve, and again from about one to three.

floors that make dancing a dream, and a good orchestra, often meet with so little success that their floors are closed within a month. The tiny, stuffy, and almost shabby club, on the other hand, may bring so much wealth to its proprietor as to leave him gasping with the wonder of it.

The secret, in practically every case, is the proprietor himself. If he has a personality which can secure the friendship of the right kind of people success awaits him. The casual dancer comes again and again, bringing his friends with him, and the fame of the club spreads rapidly in the right circle. It develops a character entirely its own. It attracts a particular class—literary people or business magnates or actors—and thus becomes something more than a mere place for dancing.

The hall on the full tide of prosperity is the one thing a dance club proprietor ought to do—and the one thing he never does. Sixty-five thousand pounds was offered for one club at the beginning of last season, and was unfortunately refused. A month or so later the proprietor sold it for \$25,000 and considered he had made a good bargain.

Another club, purchased for \$30,000 nearly two years ago, brought in \$200,000 within twelve months of its opening and then sold for \$215,000. Today it does not even exist.
