RUSSIAN VICTORY SOUTH OF BUCHAREST

Germans Threatening Bucharest Have Been Driven Back by Russians and Roumanians Who Captured Large Quantity of Booty Including 26 Guns.

PETROGRAD, Dec. 4.—It is officially announced that Russian troops arrived south of Bucharest and engaged in a great battle to save the Roumanian capital.

RUSSIA'S CLAIM TO THE DARDANELLES.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Dec. 4.—An event surpassing in far reaching importance actual military operations of war comes today in a public announcement by the new Russian Premier, Alexander Trepoff.

Simultaneously, while the fate of Bucharest is still hanging in the balance comes news that Russia, which has been accused in some quarters of failing to render assistance to its sorely pressed ally, is making heroic efforts to turn the tide of events in Roumania.

BULGARIANS SUFFER A SEVERE REVERSE

Serbian Have Captured Strongly Fortified Positions, Taking Prisoners, Guns and Munitions in Battle Lasting Several Days.

(Special to the Guardian.) SALONIKI, Dec. 4.—A Serbian official communication today tells of the capture of heavily fortified Bulgarian positions north of Grunishite and Budimirtsa, east of the Cerna river.

THE WAR SITUATION IN ALL THEATRES

Conflicting Reports on Roumanian Situation. Heavy Artillery Fighting on Western Front.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The armies of the Teutonic Allies fighting in south western Roumania, with Bucharest as their main objective have joined hand from the Danube in the south to the north of Bucharest where, coming through the mountain region they have reached the town of Tergovista.

In Dobruja to the northwest, along the Buko Winara and Transylvanian fronts violent fighting is in progress. According to Sofia in the former region the Bulgarians repulsed heavy Russian attacks.

1,000 LIVES LOST BY CYCLONE IN FRENCH INDIA

THE CABINET CRISIS NOT YET EXPLAINED
