

WEEKS CANADA SILVER FOX FURS

FRICADELLES.

For each cupful of finely chopped roast veal allow one rather thick slice of bread freed from crust, one half of a tablespoonful of chopped parsley, salt and pepper to taste, a pinch of powdered thyme, a few drops of onion juice and two well-beaten eggs for three cupfuls of meat. Over the bread pour just sufficient hot milk to moisten it, mash and mix with the meat and other ingredients. Form with the hands into small cakes and fry lightly in a pan in a little hot butter. AROUND THE FOX EXCHANGES

From increasing inquiries from the old country it is evident that interest in the fox industry as the most attractive field for investment at present is expanding in that quarter. More, the inquiries are not confined to London but come from Liverpool and other parts of England as well.

That there is good money in foxes is well illustrated in a rather indirect way, showing that even the slightest connection with the industry is bound to run to profit. An old farmer who, a few days ago, for driving four city fellows into town who had been stranded twelve or more miles out through the sudden death of their horse, asked for and got his remuneration, the carcass of the animal. The next day he disposed of it as fox meat for the tidy sum of \$25. He was a wily old cuss, this farmer, as had the owner of the horse been aware of the profit that was to be made out of a dead horse, he would have thought twice before driving that bargain with the farmer.

With the good news that is coming in daily from the various fox ranches regarding the progress of the season of increase, the hearts of shareholders in fox companies are being made very glad. Up to the present it is stated that seven litters have arrived at the Dalton Fox Company's ranch, while the Massachusetts Company, whose ranch is on the Mount Edward Road, report two litters. Other companies, among them the Three Rivers and the Imperial at Montague, also announce the arrival of litters.

Where there is such considerable and increasing inquiry into the fox industry and demand for reliable information concerning it, a pamphlet which has just been published at the instance of the Provincial Government is of inestimable worth, inasmuch as it furnishes an authentic record of all the fox companies incorporated in this province by letters patent and by acts of the legislature up to the 24th March. It shows that there were at that date no fewer than 153 companies incorporated in this Island, with a total capitalization of \$16,773,900. Of these, it is worthy of note, ten only were incorporated in 1912; the remainder being incorporated in 1913 and this year so far as it has gone. It is still more worthy of mention that the total capitalization of these ten companies is \$335,000; their average capital being thus \$33,500—a fact that is of considerable interest in comparison with the average capital of the companies more recently formed. A memo to the pamphlet shows that there were at the same date five companies, with a total capital of \$1,775,000, not incorporated in P. E. Island but doing business herein in connection with the breeding and raising of foxes.
