JUDGE BLAMES REDUCED PAY

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—Failure of wives to reduce expenditures in conformity to reduced incomes, unwise advice by parents, the "triangles" and the mother-in-law problems were named by Judge Vivian Frank Gable, of Domestic Relations Division of Municipal Court, as prime causes of marital discord.

At the end of his six months' service in Domestic Relations Court, Judge Gable revealed the impressions gained as he presided over more than 5,000 cases of unhappy family relations.

"Mothers and fathers, through misguided advice, are influencing wives and husbands to separate when some good old-fashioned common sense would keep them together," he said.

"If wives of husbands whose incomes have been reduced would realize we are living in strained industrial conditions they would adjust their spendings to conform to the husbands' reduced earnings."

"It is nonsense to blame the much-abused prohibition amendment as the principal source of family breakups," Judge Gable said. "Actually, our court has a greatly reduced number of cases traceable to liquor than it had 25 years ago."

WEBSTER-BLACKSTONE WAR; LAW BOOK WINNER

MALDEN, Mass., Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—Tom Gildea, wine brick salesman, may know his language, but he doesn't know his law.

He was arraigned in court charged with being a "transient" vendor.

Before Judge E. G. Davis, Gildea unpoocketed a much-thumbed and coverless dictionary, and, pitting Noah Webster against Blackstone, took vigorous exception to the word "transient."

He quoted from the dictionary to show that "transient" means "short, momentary, soon passed, hasty, fleeting, transitory." How could he be called that, he wanted to know, in view of the fact that he had paid two months' rent for his local wine brick store?

The prosecutor said he was enforcing the general laws of the commonwealth, not dictionary definitions, and Judge Davis, concurring, fined the defendant \$125.

FARMERS BEAT LOW PRICES

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—The low prices of ordinary farm crops will not affect a number of farmers in the Great Falls district this year.

These farmers realized last spring that the price of wheat, corn and other grains probably would be lower this fall than they have been for years, so they decided to raise crops which are rarely planted in this country and which bring high returns.

Two thousand acres of linus seed will be harvested in the section in the near future. Linus seed is used to feed canaries and other pet birds. More than 400 carloads of this feed is necessary to supply the demand each year. Ordinarily it is imported from South America. The crop between here and Glacier Park was estimated as being anywhere from 700 to 1,000 pounds to the acre. It is handled much the same as grain. Until this year linus has never been grown in the United States on a commercial basis.

Other farmers planted fields of soy beans. The oil from these beans is used in much the same

SHOPPING STEAMER ON NEW LINER

PARIS, Sept. 15. (British United Press)—A miniature Rue de Rivoli, with every type of shop that is found in a fashionable shopping district, is a striking feature of the new liner Atlantique which will go into the South Atlantic service next year.

The main deck of the Atlantique has been made to resemble a street with shops on either side. These will represent most of the commercial activities of "uptown" Paris. There will be a motor car showroom, and tailors', jewellers, customers, milliners and dressmakers establishments on this floating street.

The luxurious new liner has a tonnage of 40,000 and is one of the four biggest ships built since the war. She has a speed of 24 knots.

COALER LOADS ENGINE IN 3 MINUTES

LONDON, Sept. 15. (British United Press)—The most up-to-date locomotive station in England, where 200 engines can be coaled in ten times the present speed, is being installed at King's Cross.

At the present time it takes half an hour to load an express passenger engine with coal. The new automatic coaler will load the same engine in three minutes, at the same time recording the amount used.
