Delegates from Charlottetown and West must take the train leaving Charlottetown at 3:10 on July 4th. A meeting of the executive and a short business session will be held the same evening. A public meeting will be held on the evening of Wednesday, July 5th. Rev. A. F. and Mrs. Robt. of Corea will be present.

There passed peacefully away on Tuesday night last, 20th inst., Mrs. Elizabeth McAsey, relict of the late Daniel McAsey, at the advanced age of 95 years and some months. About sixty-five years ago Mrs. McAsey and her husband emigrated from Waterford, Ireland, and after spending one year at Bay Chaleur, N.B., they moved to Cherry Hill (near Mt. Stewart) in this Province, and at the rest of things, she was spent in the same place. Mr. McAsey died twenty-two years ago, ever since which time the deceased resided with her son Robert on the old home stead. There were twelve children—four girls and eight boys in Mrs. McAsey's family, but only four survive her—Jonathan in Washington, D.C.; Daniel at Mt. Stewart and Miss Mary Jane and Robert at home. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. E. S. Weeks on Thursday, 22nd and burial took place in the old Presbyterian cemetery on the St. Peter's Road, Lot 39.

Owing to the coronation festivities the Ontario Boards were not held consequently and no cable was received. The auditor's report was received and showed a balance of \$14,539.

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**WOMAN KILLED; BABE IN ARMS**

NEW YORK, June 21.—Because she had obtained a summons for him and had repeatedly refused to return to live with him, John Omega, a forger, shot and killed Mrs. Camelia Grucio, eighteen years old, while she was holding her baby, in the kitchen of a Greek restaurant in Grand St., Williamsburg.

With two policemen after him, Bridge, a short distance away and Omega made for the Williamsburg bridge on an Interborough surface car leaving for Manhattan. The car was half way across the structure when Policeman Wrightman and Paterson, of the Bedford avenue station, reached the plaza. They ran to the police telephone box, but no communication could be established and Omega escaped.

Mrs. Grucio was employed as a waitress in Charles Papa's restaurant, Grand St. Omega entered the restaurant. A dozen workmen were eating there. Omega met the young woman at the kitchen door. She handed him a summons she had obtained the day before from Magistrate Dodd.

"This will stop you from annoying me any more," she said.

"And this will stop you, I guess," Omega replied, and drawing a revolver shot the woman dead. The baby in her arms fell to the floor with her but was not hurt. As she lay there the man discharged his revolver at her again and fled.

The woman's husband, Martin Grucio, told the police that his wife about a year ago went away with Omega. Three months ago she came back to Williamsburg, intending to return to her husband. She feared Omega would kill her, Grucio, said and went to work as a waitress.

**ENGLAND ABLAZE WITH CHAIN OF BONFIRES**

LONDON, June 22.—The police arrangements which had been so strongly condemned beforehand worked admirably today. Notwithstanding the myriads of people in the streets casualties were happily few. All vehicular traffic along the line of the illuminated route was suspended before midnight, and crowds bent on viewing the illuminations were kept moving in two constant streams.

The dazzling rain had no adverse effect on the extraordinary brilliant display of electric devices. The principal buildings in the City and the West End and the central space at the Banquet Hall, illuminated with something like solar radiance, and the homes of unromantic coronation seemed transformed into fairy palaces.

Within this small area were twenty thousand electric lights and they cast a reflection into the sky that must have been seen for many miles.

**CHAIN OF BONFIRES.**

Not only London but the whole country joined in the celebrations. 2,500 bonfires were lighted simultaneously throughout the Kingdom. The signal for lighting the chain of bonfires was the firing of a rocket at Crystal Palace. This was done by Anthony Asquith, the Premier's nine-year-old son. He said: "I hope the rocket fired tonight will not only light the coronation beacons throughout the land, but will kindle fresh fires of love and devotion to the King and the Empire in the hearts of everyone of you."

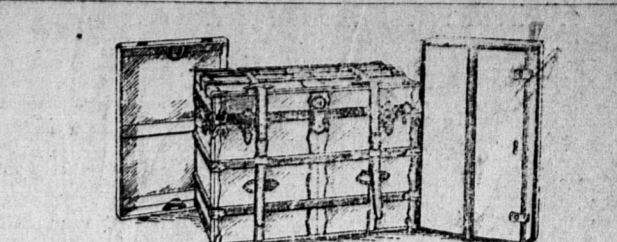
