LONDON'S MEAT SUPPLY

London, April 29. — Argentina in 1924 again led the world in supplying London with meat. Statistics just issued show that 224,866 tons of Argentine meat were distributed through the central market at Smithfield, as compared with 104,843 from the British Isles, 90,972 from Australia and New Zealand, 8,961 from Canada and the United States, and 50,878 from other countries.
The report shows that London's meat bill for the year was £36,500,000.
