Dick McCann, New York boxing writer, suggests that he's probably the first fighter in ring history to win a title by having his throat cut. When his tonsils were snipped out he was a new man.

In quick order, he kayoed Chester Rice, who had given Beau Jack a couple of tough fights, and Roman Alvarez, who had a following in New York. Then he knocked out the Costantino, Gene Johnson and Henry Vasquez, earning the right to challenge for Beau Jack's title. The youthful Canadian champion used a Granfield defence for his victory.

Brooklyn Dodgers Split Doubleheader With Cubs

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers remained a half game behind the National League-leading St. Louis Cardinals today by splitting a doubleheader with Cubs before a crowd of 30,360, largest turnout in Chicago this season.

The Dodgers swung out a 4-3 victory in the 11-inning opener then took an 11-5 trimming in the after-piece.

Max Macon got his sixty on the season in the extended first game when he singled to drive Augie Galan home with the clinching run.

Cincinnati Reds outlasted Boston Braves in a 14-inning struggle in the first half of a scheduled double bill. Cincinnati led 4-3 before weather conditions called a halt to the second game in the first half of the first inning.

It was the first Sunday game the Reds have won this year. In St. Louis, Stan Musial's hitting streak was broken after 27 consecutive games in an abbreviated game between the Cardinals and Philadelphia which was called after five innings with the score tied, 1-1.

The second game of a scheduled doubleheader was postponed.

Pittsburgh Pirates lightened their grip on third place as they gave New York Giants two decisive trimmings, 18-1 and 7-0, at Pittsburgh to the delight of 21,358 fans.

Saturday the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals climbed back to the top of the league standings when they routed out Philadelphia Phillies while Brooklyn Dodgers were bowing to Chicago Cubs.

A lone run in the sixth inning, an inning before the game was called, gave the Cubs their victory at home, 1-0. The Brooklyn-Chicago game was equally close, with the Cubs finally edging out a 3-2 decision.

Boston Braves whined Cincinnati Reds 7-5. The lowly New York Giants defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-1.

Count Fleet Is Winner Of Belmont Stakes

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—Count Fleet won the 128th running of the Belmont stakes Saturday.

Adding the Belmont to his previous victories in the Derby and Preakness to become the sixth triple crown winner in racing history the Count finished 30 lengths in front of William Dupont's Fairman Hurst.

Beverly Bogert's Deseronto was a length farther back, last in the field of three.

Leading from end to end, the Count rattled off the mile and a half in 2:28 1/5, chipping two-fifths of a second off the record for the stake which War Admiral set six years ago.

The victory was worth \$38,340 to Mrs. John D. Herz's colt and boosted his earnings to \$250,300. Fairy Manhurst pocketed \$5,000 for second and Deseronto collected \$2,500 for third. The Count was piloted by his regular Canadian jockey Johnny Longden.

In following Sir Barton, Gallant Fox, Omaha, War Admiral and Whirlaway into the list of triple crown winners, the Count also became the second horse to this "big three" and the Withers mile. Sir Barton 1919 the only previous colt to turn the trick.

Gunder Haegg Loses Dashes To Greg Rice

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—Gunder Haegg, the swift Swede, arrived in New York today with a toothy grin, an Alaska gold nugget as a good luck charm and a violinist's haircut, only to lose a pair of dashes to Greg Rice, the United States exponent of middle distance running.

Haegg, who owns seven world records from 1,500 to 5,000 metres, appeared drawn as he stepped from the airplane although he said he was nine pounds over his top running weight following a four-week ocean trip on a tanker which ended at New Orleans late Saturday.

He was met at the airport by Rice and members of the Swedish Consulate. The two athletes took a couple of turns about the plane for the benefit of photographers with Rice winning both.

Yanks Defeat Browns 2-1 To Retain Lead

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—New York Yankees kept their grip on the American League lead today by stopping St. Louis Browns in both ends of a doubleheader, 2-1 in 11 innings and 10-6, before a crowd of 32,228.

The first affair was the seventh-extra-inning game in the last eight contests for the beleaguered Browns and it was decided on three singles in the 11th after Lefty Al Hollingsworth and Aley Donald had staged an almost air-tight hurling duel up to that point.

Washington Senators tightened their grip on second place by sweeping both games of a double-header at home from Detroit Tigers, 5-1 and 8-4, before 20,000 fans. Two rookie hurlers, Ewing and Bill Mille Candini, were credited with the victories.

Pyle won the first game at the expense of Paul Trout and Candini bested Frank Overmire, Tiger rookie.

Boston Red Sox took both ends of a doubleheader in Boston from White Sox, 4-3 and 3-2, coming from behind in each game after losing three straight in single engagements with the Chicago team.

farmers of Prince Edward Island are being well treated by the authorities. I myself hunted all over Ontario and secured over three tons of assorted No. 1 clover seed and five tons of 70 percent mixture which Ontario and Quebec farmers needed badly. The mixture will arrive about June 9. The Island is also getting about 6,000 more tons of fertilizer than their proper share. This could not have been done had the tobacco growers not been cut 20 percent and other measures taken. We owe a good deal to our fertilizer administrator, who evidently thinks good use can be made of fertilizer by our farmers in producing essential crops in our splendid soil and climate.

I found myself rather busy on various items on my list namely, the car ferry, sanatorium, wool regulators, fisheries, Irish Moss, milk driers, poultry problems, marine dock, fertilizers and feeds for next year, as well as transportation in an emergency which might arise.

"Respecting the ferry it is only fair to say to the people of our Island that given ideal conditions, a new ferry boat could not be ready before August, 1945.
