The latest news, first of all.

The Northumberland arrived at eight o'clock last night, and the mail train came in at nine fifty.

A. K. Henry, Postmaster, Granville, returns this morning from attending the Sunday School Convention held in this city.

Rev. E. Bell and Mrs. Bell, York, and Rev. Mr. Wightman, Montague, were among the passengers returning to their homes on the afternoon train east, yesterday.

One of the best evening's sports ever given in this City will be put on at the Arena tomorrow evening. A large list of competitors has already been received and more are coming.

The Arena Rink will be the centre of attraction tomorrow evening, when the great indoor sports will be held. There will be jumping, leaping, running and bicycle races, all of which promise to be the most exciting ever witnessed.

The Big Potato competition conducted by Beer & Weeks is becoming more interesting; each day up to noon on Tuesday Covehead was ahead and Belle Creek second. None of the potatoes, so far this year, have reached the record of last year.

Thanksgiving will be observed on the Pownal Methodist circuit with special services in the various churches on Sunday. Clifton at 11 a.m., Mt. Herbert at 2.30 p.m., and Pownal at 7 p.m. The churches are being decorated with an offering of the fruits of orchard and field, for this occasion.

The Maritime "Merchant" of Halifax called up A. J. Davis, of Davis & Fraser, the other day, to make some enquiries regarding the local Pork situation. Mr. Fraser reported that not very many hogs had come on the market so far this season, though the number was up to the average for the time of year, as farmers always wait for a little colder weather before marketing their hogs. The price 10 to 10 1/2c dressed, was enough inducement to encourage early marketing, but the supply was still very small. He said that it was so soon to judge what the hog supply would be like, but he thought there ought to be the usual quantity. This time last year the price was nine to nine and a half cents. Regarding Prince Edward Island deliveries, Mr. Davis said that they had not been to date as large as in Nova Scotia, but then, he explained, the Prince Edward Island farmers always wait a little longer than the Nova Scotia farmers to market their hogs. He understood that the situation in the Island was about the same as it was a year ago. Mr. Davis' opinion is that the present price will have to weaken a little as soon as the supply becomes freer; because, at the present time, the price is really higher than it ought to be for barrelled pork purposes. He does not think however, that we shall see the low prices that used to prevail in dressed pork a few years ago; and that from this time forward there ought to be great inducements for farmers to engage in hog-raising. Any farmer who gets in for hog-raising, said Mr. Davis, ought to make money at it nowadays.
