LLOYD'S PATRIOTIC FUND.

British Naval and Military Fund Which
Was Founded in 1803.

It is just 100 years ago that the
Patriotic Fund, the oldest naval and
military fund of the kind in existence
in Great Britain, now known as
Lloyd's Patriotic Fund, was founded
by the subscribers to Lloyd's. On
July 20, 1803, a meeting was held
of the merchants and underwriters
for the purpose of raising a fund for
the benefit of the sufferers by the
war which was then raging between
this country and Napoleon Bonaparte.
The meeting was presided over
by Mr. Brook Watson, and the
intention of the founders is best ex-
plained by the following resolution
which was passed on that occasion:
"Resolved, that to animate the ef-
forts of our defenders by sea and
land, it is expedient to raise by the
patriotism of the community at
large a suitable fund for their com-
fort and relief; for the purpose of
assuaging the anguish of their
wounds, or palliating in some de-
gree the more weighty misfortune of
the loss of limbs; of alleviating the
distresses of the widow and orphan,
of soothing the brow of sorrow for
the fall of dearest relatives, the
props of unhappy indigence or help-
less age; the granting of pecuniary
rewards or honorable badges of dis-
tinction for successful exertions of
valor or merit."

In an interesting little history of
the fund published by Lloyd's it is
recorded that by March, 1805,
£158,343 had been subscribed, and
by 1825, when the subscriptions prac-
tically ceased, the total amounted to
£430,509. This sum, by judicious
management in the way of invest-
ment, by the operation of long annu-
ities, and sale of securities at great-
ly enhanced prices, was eventually
increased in value to £883,602. The
list was headed by Lloyd's with
£20,000 consols, to be supplemented
later by £15,000, while the subscrib-
ers to Lloyd's contributed over £70,
000 within a fortnight. The Lord
Mayor and Corporation of London,
the Bank of England, the East India
Company, the City Companies, the
bankers and the Archbishops, Bish-
ops, Judges, ministers and other pub-
lic men subscribed, as did also num-
berless humble contributors, who sent
half-crowns and shillings. Even a
Quaker gave thirty guineas for blank-
ets.

It will be noticed that the fund
was not only for the relief of those
in distress, but also for the granting
of rewards; and the first occasion on
which the fund was used was when,
in February, 1804, a squadron of
French ships of war was repulsed by
some East India merchantmen.
Swords of honor were presented to
the commanders and his captains,
while the families of those who had
fallen were granted assistance. After
Trafalgar a vase with £300 was pre-
sented to Lady Nelson and £61,000
consols were given to the Royal Naval
Asylum. The trustees have still on
their books for relief aged ladies
whose fathers or relatives fought un-
der Nelson at Trafalgar or under
Wellington in Spain. The fund con-
tinued its patriotic work in the many
wars which took place after the great
struggle with Napoleon was conclud-
ed, and particulars are given in the
little history, but it must be suffi-
cient to say here that the general
work of the fund was continued
throughout the remaining years of
the last century. In the year 1875
the committee decided to place the
balance of the capital funds, about
£78,000, under the Charity Commis-
sioners, in whose name they are now
invested, and under a scheme ap-
proved by whom the trustees are
elected and the funds administered.
In recent years, by a new departure,
one officer from the army and one
from the navy has been elected, much
to the satisfaction of their colleag-
ues.

But it should not be imagined that
there is no more need for help on
the part of the public. The payments
from the fund are very large, and the
resources extremely limited, so that
the trustees will always welcome fur-
ther subscriptions to this excellent
and patriotic institution.—London
Globe.

Charred Molasses as a Fertilizer.

The Louisiana sugar-planters have not
yet been able to solve the riddle of the
bestowal of their surplus molasses. It is
now proposed to use it as a fertilizer. It
is found that the molasses can be charred
by waste heat in sugar manufacture,
and, much reduced in weight, and free
from liability to offensive or trouble-
some fermentation, be easily added to
the soil as a commercial fertilizer.
When in this state it is devoid of sticki-
ness, easy to handle and contains a large
part of the mineral fertilizers taken by
the cane from the soil, as well as the lime
used in clarifying. A temperature of 350
degrees (Fahrenheit) is sufficient to de-
stroy the objectionable gumminess, ex-
ceed nearly all the water and to so char
the molasses that it is fit to return to the
soil. It is suggested that the sugar
manufacturers can easily place a large
pipe in the waste heat of their fur-
naces for the charring of the molasses
filter press cakes, etc. The mass would
be removed by a chain scraper passing
slowly through the pipe and, charred
and dry, and pulverized, it would be
ready for instant and effective use as a
fertilizer.

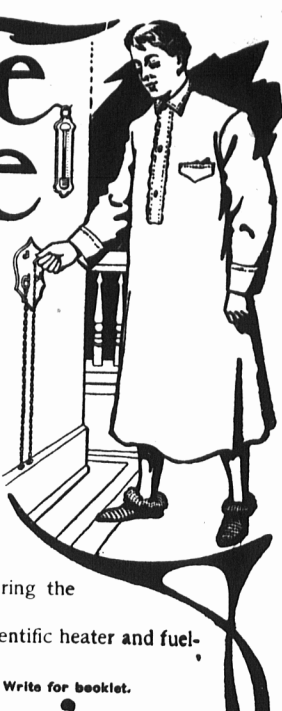
