FIFTEEN BANKS FAIL IN SOUTH FLORIDA

TAMPA, Fla., July 22.—Failure of fifteen State banks in Southwest Florida today, with aggregate deposits of more than \$22,600,000, was regarded tonight by Ernest Amos, State Comptroller, as being the "darkest hour just before the dawn." Mr. Amos said he believed the primary cause of the failure was "unnecessary withdrawals, propaganda and the mental attitude of the people." Aggregate capital stock of the fifteen financial institutions which closed today, according to figures at the State Banking Department, was \$31,630,000; deposit \$221,575,728.97, and assets \$291,841,366.68. Eight other banks have failed in Florida in the past two weeks, bringing the total number of failures within that time to twenty-three.
