Mr. B. W. Robinson was unanimously re-elected President and Mr. C. R. Rogers, Vice-President for the ensuing year.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

During the year, reported President Robinson, the Board lost by death three of its most valued members. Hon. Leonard McNeill, who was a former Councillor of the Board, and in every phase of his public life had shown himself ready to promote the best interests of the Town and Province.

LIVESTOCK EXCHANGE

MONTREAL, Jan. 17.—There were 116 cattle, 198 calves, 570 hogs and 49 sheep and lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today.

The work of the Tourist Committee and the importance to Canada of the tourist traffic, were dealt with.

Referring to the Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa last summer, the President said the Board had prepared some information for the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in connection with their submission to the Conference.

'Perhaps one of the greatest benefits derived from the Ottawa Conference has been the increased use of our railways and Maritime ports in the exporting of wheat and other commodities. The importance of this can be readily realized when you read of the non-Canadian interests to have it diverted to American ports.

The Board continued during the year its affiliation with the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, the Maritime Board of Trade and the Prince Edward Island Associated Boards of Trade.

The President expressed appreciation of the comparatively fortunate position of our people at the present time, particularly of Summerside with regard to the fox industry.
