if they wish or if anything of a controversial nature arises, Mr. Justice Archambault added. Dorchester Penitentiary, first constructed in the eighties and since added to, was the scene of a brief but noisy riot on Jan. 7, 1933. Two convicts were wounded, one of them seriously, when guards fired on a milling mob in the prison yard. The actual outbreak lasted about three hours although the convicts yammered all night. Warden George T. Goad and his officers were not unaware a disturbance was planned. Two hours before the riot, convicts employed as barbers in the prison barber shop were ordered to turn in their razors.

At four o'clock, a gang of about 20 prisoners working on a sand pile threw down their shovels and walked toward a section in the prison yard known as the dome. They were quickly joined by others in the yard, but armed guards led by Deputy Warden Edgar Cummings halted them and forced them to drop the pick handles, stones and other weapons they had picked up.

Another group wrecking one of the work sheds was routed when a guard threw a gas bomb into the little building. They were weeded out in groups of eight and locked up. Meanwhile, in the main building, other convicts, as though acting on a pre-arranged signal, were wrecking fittings and breaking lights and windows. The laundry was set on fire but, cowed by armed guards who trained riot guns on them, the convicts quickly extinguished the blaze.

James Izzard, a negro prisoner, was shot and seriously wounded and another convict named Webber was slightly wounded by gunfire during the outbreak.

By seven o'clock the rioting was subdued and all convicts locked in their cells. At an investigation later, several of the ringleaders were given additional two-year terms.

CORONATION OATH ALTERED

LONDON, Oct. 7.—(CP cable) — When the King takes the Coronation oath at Westminster Abbey next May 12 he may use a form of words different from that of his predecessors.

It was made known tonight that the oath has been slightly altered in order to comply with the provisions of the Statute of Westminster, which changed the status of the dominions.

The new wording, which was evolved after consultation between ecclesiastical and constitutional authorities, will not be revealed until the full program for the coronation is issued. It is understood the Coronation service will be shorter than at the Coronation of King George V because of the absence of a Queen consort.

It was also announced during the day that the Coronation committee had proposed the customary act of homage to the King be performed by all the Dominion Prime Ministers. At the last two coronations the Prime Minister of Great Britain has rendered homage on behalf of all the premiers of the Empire as well as himself.

Mackenzie. "The final question is two-fold: "1. The nature and extent of the development and extension program considered necessary for our local defence.

"2. The extent to which the hard-pressed Canadian taxpayer is able and willing to meet new burdens and new taxes.

"The first of these is a question for the Government upon the advice of its experts.

"The second is essentially a question for the parliament and people of Canada." The defence policy by which he had been governed since taking office, he said, was: "1. The general interest of Canada.

each he declared to be: "1. Each self-governing portion of the empire is primarily responsible for its local defence.

"2. The security of the Empire is a matter of concern to all its governments.

"3. The military action taken at any time in peace or war is a matter for individual decision on the part of each Empire Government"

The Minister said the Government's defence policy was "not a dictated policy. It is a policy for the defence of Canada in peace, or in the eventuality of war." He promised a report on his activities during his first year in office at the next session of Parliament.

Canada's defence policy, Mr. Mac-

kenzie added, would be decided in the light of the coldest real single view to the greatest benefit for Canada and Canada the least possible cost."

VIENNA, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Emil Fey, fiery "ousted" leader of the Vienna Heimwehr, challenged Prince Ernst von Hemberg to a duel.

Both were waiting at the municipal airfield, where a gigantic reception had been planned for him when news that he was safe was given them by Minister of Communications Albert Forslund. "I am so glad, so glad," exclaimed the flier's mother, Mrs. Hanna Bjorkvall, who had been bravely fighting back tears through the night as no word came of her son's whereabouts.

When told the Swedish aviator had been forced down, Miss Dickson declared, "what a pity!" But she quickly added, "but don't you think it's fine of him, all the same?"

Throughout Sweden, interest in the attempted 4,500-mile solo flight had mounted to fever pitch. Bjorkvall is the first pilot to attempt a trans-Atlantic flight with Sweden as the goal.

Newspapers here have been full of his blunt "no to the Baroness" take-off from New York. (In his dawn hop, Bjorkvall left behind a sorrowing and resentful Swedish peeress, the beautiful Baroness Eva von Blixen-Finecke, who has been planning to make the flight with him and turned up at the airport, togged out in a pair of flannel slacks, white blouse and sport coat, only to be informed that "Bjorky" was going alone.)
