**UNEMPLOYMENT CONDITIONS IN STATES WORSE**

Canadians Being Crowded Out to Leave Jobs Open For Americans — Canada Much Better off.

LONDON, Ont., June 7.—Unemployment in the United States is driving Canadians back home, and departures for the other side of the border are back to pre-war level. May of this year saw sixty-three permits issued by the American Consulate here to departing Canadians from the London district. In the corresponding month last year 125 permits were issued. Reports from the American side of the frontier show that conditions are worse over there than in Canada and that Canadians are being crowded out to leave jobs open for Americans.

**BENNETT URGES WORKERS TO DO THEIR UTMOST**

In United Effort That Toronto Might, By Greater Majorities Than Ever Return Another Solid Conservative Phalanx to Ottawa.

TORONTO, June 7.—Leading conservative workers in this city were urged yesterday by Hon. R. B. Bennett, Federal Conservative Leader to put forth their utmost in a united effort that Toronto might, by greater majorities than ever, return another solid Conservative phalanx to Ottawa in the present election. The occasion for this exhortation by the Party Leader was a private luncheon given him by the Central Conservative Association in the Royal York Hotel. The function was attended by all the Toronto members of the Legislature, including Hon. W. H. Price, Attorney General, the City's nine representatives in the recently dissolved Parliament and the executives of the Conservative Ward Associations of the city, numbering in all about 100.

City organization plans for the impending campaign were discussed. The discussion was in the nature of a round table conference with Mr. Bennett in a glowing inspirational address taking a leading part.

BUCHAREST, Roumania, June 8.—Prince Carol today recovered the throne he gave up for a woman five years ago, and was proclaimed King of Roumania, his son Michael being named as next in succession. Both Houses of Parliament had previously voted to restore Carol's rights, first separately and then jointly as the National Assembly.

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**PRINCE CAROL'S RETURN CAUSES CONSTERNATION**

Will Take Young Son Michael's Place On Throne — Sensational Developments Expected

BUCHAREST, Roumania, June 7.—It has been decided that former Crown Prince Carol, who made a dramatic return to Bucharest by airplane from exile yesterday, is to be proclaimed King of Roumania. This evening the country was reported calm. The Council of Ministers met in special session, from 8:30 to 9:30 to study the situation created by Carol's return.

Carol, father of Roumania's 8 year old boy King Michael, flew back to his home land from exile in Paris at 10 p. m. last night and today was the centre of a turbulent political situation which portended impending sensational developments. His return was the result of negotiations with friends and emissaries of the peasant party Government covering months. When recently he promised to forego the pleasure of Mme. Lupescus company, the Liberal opposition which, when in power was chiefly responsible for his being deposed at home, awoke anew to its dislike of him and fought bitterly to prevent his return.

Friends met him as he arrived by plane at Cotroceni airdrome. He got into immediate touch with the Government and Premier Maniu who urgently convoked the Council of Ministers in an extraordinary session to determine in what form Carol could participate constitutionally in his country's affairs. Negotiations were begun immediately to place him in the Regency replacing his younger brother Prince Nicholas, who is leaving on a foreign tour June 18. To meet any emergency the Premier extended the current Parliamentary session until June 14. A censorship was established over the entire country, but the news ban was lifted later and almost normal communication permitted. Premier Juliu Maniu announced today that he would await a Royal proclamation, taking cognizance of Prince Carol's return from exile and then would resign. It was believed that he would be asked to form another Government this time composed of representatives of all the parties.

**MURPHY FOUND NOT GUILTY**

No Appointments Made By King At Sat.'s Meeting

SUMMERSIDE, June 8.—In the Supreme Court at Summerside on Saturday the Court concluded with the case of John Murphy, charged with incest during the whole of the day. Mr. Johnston, K. **DEATH OF MR. P. POPE ON SATURDAY**

Was Highly Esteemed Throughout The City And Province.

**MAR. POTATO SHIPPERS TO MEET**

Commodity Rates to Be Gone Into With Railway Officials.

PERTH, June 9.—A meeting of the Maritime potato shippers and their representatives has been arranged through F. C. Cornell, Maritime freight rates expert, with the representatives of the Canadian National Railway and the Canadian Pacific Railway, to be held in the office of M. F. Tompkins, traffic manager, C. N. R., Moncton, at 10:30 a. m. on Thursday, June 12.

Among matters to be taken up at this meeting are: Establishment of permanent commodity rates to the Canadian Northwest; establishment of commodity rates to all Ontario and Quebec points; adoption of a spread in rates between bagged or barreled potatoes and bulk potatoes; the matter of average agreements for demurrage, also proposed for consideration.

A representative delegation of potato shippers from Prince Edward Island is expected to attend. An invitation is also being extended to representatives of the different Maritime governments.

It is hoped to also discuss other matters in which the Maritime potato industry is concerned in the afternoon of June 12.

**PASSAGE OF U. S. TARIFF BILL IN DOUBT**

Forty-six In Favor and Same Number Against Adoption of Final Form of Measure.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Passage of the tariff bill now in grave doubt in the Senate, according to an informal poll made today by the United Press which showed a tie total of 46 in favor and 46 against adoption of the final form of the measure, with four Senators yet doubtful. The figures include a dozen Senators, who may be absent when the vote is taken next week. This prevents any definite prediction as to the outcome. Segregating the doubtful ones the Democratic, Independent, Republican coalitionists claim a lineup of 49 to 47 against the bill. A week ago the coalitionists were ready to concede the bill would pass. The Republican administration forces claim they will win by a tie because they say Vice-President Curtis will cast the deciding ballot in their favor. If the measure is rejected as it stands, they have indicated they will not drop it, but will take it back to conference and eliminate the \$1 per thousand feet duty on soft lumber.

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**TEN IS DEATH TOLL AS THE RESULT OF HEAT**

Five Are Drowned On Advent of Summer Weather In Ontario.

TORONTO, June 8.—With the advent of the summer heat wave throughout Ontario, a large fatality list was recorded yesterday as people endeavored to find relief from the scorching sun. Ten persons died violently. Five of them were drowned, one a suicide as the result of the heat. Automobile smashers claimed three lives as people sought the open, and trains accounted for two.

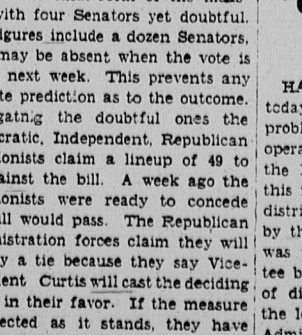
