In Memoriam

FLORA MAE MARTIN

The death occurred at the home of her brother, Alexander, in Havelfield West, on Saturday morning, Oct. 5, of Flora Mae Martin, in her 45th year. Born at Valleyfield, P. E. I., daughter of Wm. A. Martin, and Christie Nicholson Martin, she was the eldest of a family of seven. She suffered the loss of her father in Nov. 1938, and again her mother in Nov. 1941. Also a sister, Jeanette, in 1930. She leaves to mourn their loss, besides a host of friends and relatives, the following sisters and brothers: Margaret, R.N., Havelfield, Mass.; Annie, Mrs. Herb Gillis, Flat River; Alexander and Christine at home; Archie, a member of the Veterans' Land Act, Charlottetown. Also two nephews and one niece, John, Bert, and Janet Gillis.

A nurse by profession, her time was joyfully given to ministering to the ill of others. She was a member of the General Stephen Henry Gale Hospital Alumnæ, having graduated from that institution Nov. 21, 1927. For a short time she did private nursing in Havelfield and until the time of her illness was employed at the Benson Hospital, Havelfield, as staff nurse, and later as operating room supervisor at the same hospital. She faithfully performed her duties in her chosen vocation, and gave herself so unselfishly and unhesitatingly to those who needed her attention. She did not, however, confine her ministry to hospital duties, but constantly thought of others, which included not only members of her own immediate family, but other relatives, and a legion of friends. It was amazing to know how many she remembered in illness and bereavement, as well as at anniversaries and special occasions. She possessed a remarkable memory, and was a gifted conversationalist and correspondent, interested in music and literature, and well posted on world affairs. Her patriotic spirit was manifest in wartime by her constant correspondence with and sending packages to many in the armed services. Her active life, however, was checked by illness over a year ago, during which time she suffered three major operations. The shock to her physical health was great despite the constant attention of the best surgeons and medical skill available. In July of this year she came a convalescent, from Havelfield, Mass. to her home in Valleyfield. For the first month it seemed as if she might recover, partially at least. But against all her brave efforts and hopes she gradually weakened. She was tenderly nursed for the past two months by her sister, Margaret, and other members of her family, who with their family doctor did everything possible to save her life and to alleviate her suffering. Despite their efforts, and the attention of other friends, she passed away eternally reward on the above mentioned date.

She was a member of the Valleyfield United Church, and was always generous in its support. Her home was a place where those who visited during her illness were appreciated, conducted the funeral service at the home on Monday, Oct. 7. He spoke words of comfort to the family and large gathering of sympathizing friends, speaking words of high commendation of the nursing profession, and how bravely the deceased endured her pain and illness.

Hymns sung by the Valleyfield choir and other friends were, "Jesus Lover of My Soul," "When My Life Work is Ended," "Safe in the Arms of Jesus." Committal service was conducted by her pastor, and her body tenderly laid to rest in the family plot in Valleyfield cemetery. Pallbearers were: Munro Bruce, Wm. A.
