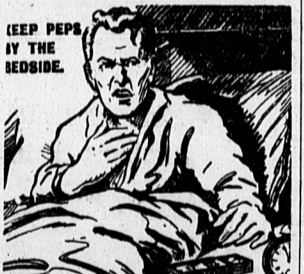

Premier King Gets Royal Welcome

TORONTO, Jan. 15.—North York's welcome to Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King yesterday at Newmarket was a remarkable demonstration of long standing affection. The Premier was there in his capacity as a private member for the constituency and gave an account of his stewardship. The meeting, which was primarily to organize the New Riding of North York, altered in redistribution, was attended by Liberals from all parts of the constituency. So many wanted to shake hands with the Premier that it was feared at one time his train would have to be held.

Evangelist Taylor At Summerside Baptist Church

With the words "I Know God" Harry Taylor closed a stirring message on Wednesday evening in his revival addresses being given nightly at the Summerside Baptist Church. He and his daughter continue to gain the appreciation and interest of the people of the different churches to whom they speak and sing. Taking his Scripture from the parable of the Lost Coin found in Luke 15, 8-10, he made the old story very tender and modern.

The audience will not soon forget "Mrs. Busybody" counting the coins around the unfortunate woman's neck and then going off to whisper, "There's only nine of them, ah, she's a hussy," the evangelist explaining that in those days when a couple became engaged the young lady was likely to receive an engagement token of ten pieces of silver to be strung around her neck with the understanding that an act of unfaithfulness would cause one of the pieces to be removed. So when this woman lost one of her pieces, how natural that she should take the broom and lamp to find it and how easy for other women to count the nine and then insinuate and gossip. Small wonder that when she found it she knocked at all the doors in the neighborhood, called out the neighbors and said: "Rejoice with me for I have found that which was lost."

One night while travelling, Harry Taylor picked up a wallet full with yellow Yankee bank notes and while changing trains he located the owner, an aristocratic looking lady. Approaching her he enquired, "Madame have you lost anything?" Tell the story he continued "She glared at me and I went outside to cool off. Then I came back with the same question and she said: "You man if you don't mind your business I'll have you arrested. Again I hurried out to cool off. Then realizing that my train was about to go I rushed in again and said to her, "Where's your wallet?" In wretched embarrassment she accepted that which was lost and pulling off a yellow note offered me my reward, which I refused, being satisfied to have returned to her that which was lost. "There are men," said he in quick application, "who think that because they have put an extra hundred dollars in their church envelopes last year they have satisfied God who is doing His utmost to restore to them that which they have lost."

From Christ's parable and his own wallet episode Mr. Taylor developed the striking theme, "Have You Lost Anything?" "Many church members," said he, "have lost their sense of sin. Conscience is like a sun dial. The dial tells the time only when the sun shines upon it. Conscience is no guide after it has been dragged through a dirty dance hall; it points the right way only when God's Word shines upon it. "In Thy Light shall we see light." Standards of right and wrong are

ever changing with about everybody but God. He changes not. What was sin in the Garden of Eden can never be anything else in God's sight. Circumstances and combination of circumstances cannot make wrong right. Without laboring his points the people were asked to consider if they had lost anything.

The preacher asked, "what are we going to do about what we have lost?" "There was a man in the Old Testament," said he, "who lost his axe in the water. Now if he had been like certain modern folks he would have kept on chopping against the logs with the handle just to keep up appearances. That ingenuity may sometimes go with old people but there is one set of folks it never fools and that is your children. You may bluff and deceive and tell that half lie, but you cannot long fool that little detective who calls you Mother."

"The man who has lost his sense of God or his ideals should do what the man who lost his axe did. He should let God make it swim. That was a miracle and there are people who do not believe in miracles and the reason is that they have never had one performed upon themselves."

Toward the close of his address Mr. Taylor who is an ardent golfer, expressed his desire to witness his first game of hockey while in Summerside, but much as he relishes good sport and admires fraternalism and other good things, he is not willing to let them surp the place in our lives and hearts which belongs to Christ and have it broadcasted from Heaven. "Thou hast lost thy first love," His little girl rings the bell of her toy telephone and chirps into it but never gets an answer simply because the instrument has no connection at the other end. A lot of people say their prayers every night because they are afraid not to, but if they have come from certain haunts and are going back to them the next opportunity they had better conserve their prayer energy for the Bible say: "If I regard iniquity in my heart Thou wilt not hear me." This God's word shows that the prayers of people who live in sin have no connection at God's end of the line. So he urged a clear stand by church members that God may give them back what they have lost and then, said he "as with a breath will blow aside everything which stands in the way of a great movement back to Him. I know He can and will because I know God." That the people are being moved by the mission is seen in the growing attendance and is being felt in other ways
