THE weather which during last week was exceptionally fine underwent a transformation on Saturday night. To a rather sultry afternoon and evening a violent windstorm succeeded about midnight. Ample warning of the storm was given the storm drum being hoisted Saturday afternoon and the barometer indicating the change by registering lower than for years. The wind blew with great force all day yesterday and a number of small casual fires were reported. In Charlottetown, fences were blown down, the roof was stripped off a barn on the premises of J. H. Gray Murphy, Great George Street, the yacht Thelma anchored off Connelly's wharf was sunk and is probably destroyed. Some trees in Victoria Park were uprooted and a good deal of injury was done to trees all over the city. Owners of orchards found their unpicked fruit under the trees, ready to be gathered when they arose yesterday morning. A high sea prevailed in the harbor, and part of the old Ferry wharf at Southport was washed away.
