

Island Title Bonspiel Gets Underway

Rinks Skipped By Premier Campbell & G. G. Hughes Are Still Undefeated

Two rinks one from Summerside and the other from Charlottetown and both last minute entries were the only undefeated teams last night as the opening day's bonspiel for the British Consols Trophy and the right to represent the Province in the Macdonald Brier Dominion finals got underway at the local Curling Club.

In top spot with three victories and no losses was G. G. Hughes' strong Charlottetown rink who chalked up three victories, two of them by one-sided margins and closely following them and proving the surprise packet of yesterday's play was Premier Thane A. Campbell's Summerside quartette with two victories against no defeats, Premier Campbell is President of the Dominion Curling Association, and by yesterday's showing is right in the thick of the fight for the Island title.

Brilliant curling, nerve-tangling finishes and upsets all featured yesterday's matches with the largest gallery in years watching the matches from one o'clock yesterday until after midnight last night. Today as the teams swing into the home stretch even better curling is fully expected with all teams yet in the running for the coveted trophy and title.

Rules of the bonspiel state that any teams losing two matches is out of the running and as a result four teams passed from the picture yesterday, rinks skipped by J. F. McLeod, Dr. H. McIntyre, Dr. L. A. Johnston and R. H. Leck suffering elimination.

This morning starting at 9 o'clock the two undefeated rinks oppose each other and fireworks is expected on each and every end of the match. Length of all the matches is 12 ends.

Curlers had a tough session of it yesterday with 15 matches being played but Mac MacKinnon, secretary of the Island Curling Association had it plenty tough too. Mac had to make up the draw for the bonspiel and if you think it is not a tough task try it some time.

Last night over 40 curlers straggled to a banquet, served in the Winchester Dining Hall and songs and short speeches made the affair an altogether enjoyable one. Short speeches were heard from Premier Thane A. Campbell, President Dr. H. McIntyre of the local Club, L. H. Poole, president of the Island Association, Mac MacKinnon, Mr. Morley Bell. The banquet was prepared by Mrs. Henry Arsenault, wife of the steward of the club and many complimentary remarks were made re the menu by those present.

Afternoon Matches

A big crowd was on hand as the first eight rinks took to the ice for the opening matches of the 'spiel and in three of them the fans saw some of the most exciting and hard fought curling ever witnessed in the Club.

Headlining the first matches was the S. Brooks of Summerside rink and Charlottetown's W. R. Cruikshank four, that was forced to an extra end as Brooks, scoring doubles on the last two ends forced the rinks to go the extra end.

Going into the eleventh end Cruikshank had a 13-9 lead and the opinion among the spectators was the City rink would hold their lead. Brooks got a two on the 11th and then the final end Summerside were counting two and remained this way until the two skips went to the tee. There was no change as both got their first stones away and Cruikshank took his final shot with Summerside still in for one. On an attempted draw Cruikshank was a little too light and Brooks came in for the second stone to tie the match up.

Hundreds Of Canadians Engaged In Curling Eliminations In Canada

TORONTO, Feb. 11—(CP)—

Hundreds of Canadians tonight are engaged in eliminations for the Canadian championship tournament of a sport brought to this country in 1859 by the British troops under Gen. Wolfe at Quebec.

The sport is curling, grown to rank as one of the most important Canadian pastimes since Gen. Wolfe's soldiers tired of idleness during the occupation of Quebec and melted down French cannon to fashion curling irons with which they curled on the frozen St. Lawrence River.

The 1942 Canadian curling championships will be played during the first week of March in Quebec within a cannon-hot of where Gen. Wolfe's soldiers routed the game to Canada. Ten rinks will compete, one from each of eight provinces and two from Ontario in the round-robin series to decide the winner of the Macdonald's Brier Tankard and the Canadian Crown. Howard Palmer skipped a Calgary rink to the championship in Toronto last March.

Three of the 10 contestants have victor over R. W. Leck's Montague rink.

Evening Matches

Highlight of the evening matches was the close, thrilling struggle waged by Premier Campbell's rink and a rink skipped by R. S. P. Jardine the former winning the match by the score of 12-11. For the entire twelve ends it was a nip and tuck battle with first one team leading and then the other. Half way through Jardine chalking a big four on the sixth end went ahead 7-6; Campbell went to the front with a double on the seventh end. Jardine tied it up a single on the eighth; the Premier went ahead again with three on the ninth; Jardine came back with two on the 10th but the winner got a single on the 11th to take a two point lead into the final end. Cruikshank and G. G. Hughes who started their match tied at two wins apiece were expected to stage a great battle but the Hughes' rink curling beautifully won 18-5. In the final match of the night H. Phillips won from W. P. Brooks 15 to 5.

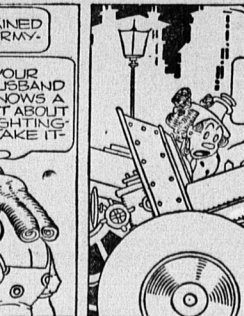

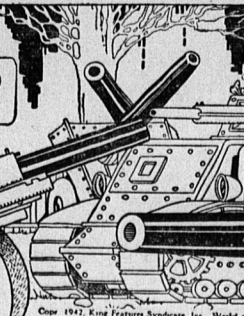

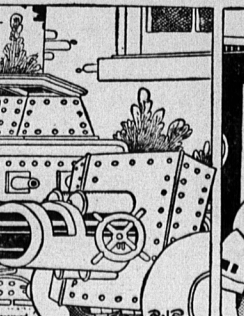
