—INTERESTING LECTURE.—On Monday evening Aug. 30th Rev. W. D. Reid, pastor of Stanley Presbyterian Church, Montreal, delivered an inspiring and interesting lecture on the great war now raging in Europe. Rev. Roland Davidson presided and after some brief remarks called on Mrs. Reid, who gave a humorous recitation entitled Me and Jim. Rev. Mr. Reid was then introduced and for more than an hour he held the closest attention of the audience as he in an eloquent and forceful manner told of the things which led up to the war, of the actions of the Germans with the Belgians and of the way in which they had endeavored to carry out their well prepared plans, all of which had however failed. The lecture was under the auspices of the Red Cross Society and at the close of the lecture the President, Mrs. Bamford, announced that it would be necessary to elect a Vice President and Sec'y-Treas. to fill the vacancies caused by the removal of those who held those offices. Mrs. Davidson was elected Vice-President and Miss Mabel McKendrick Sec'y-Treas. The sum of thirty-nine dollars was realized which will go to the Red Cross Fund.—P.

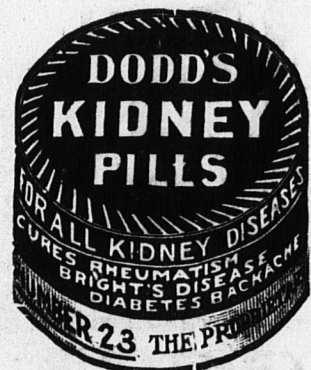
