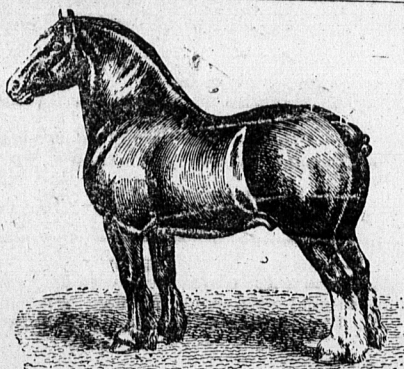

LUSITANIA GETS OCEAN RECORD

Time of Voyage, Liverpool to New York Four Days and Twenty Hours— All Records of the German Liners Now Broken

New York, Oct. 11—Lusitania passed Sandy Hook lightship at 1.25 a. m. The time of voyage was four days and twenty hours. On Board S. S. Lusitania, Oct. 10. Three thousand passengers crowded the decks of the Lusitania at 5.25 p. m. today, New York time, to watch her steam past Nantuxet lightship, twenty-five knots an hour.

NEW ICE BREAKER WILL DO WORK

Built on a Guarantee—If She Does Not Keep the Channel Open the Government Will Have Recourse Against the Builders

OTTAWA, October 9—The Minister of Marine gives out an interview in which he says that while already he paid considerable attention to navigation in addition to the those of Northumberland straits he consulted all the well-known experts of Europe as to ice-breaking steamers, and came to the conclusion that the conditions in the Northumberland straits were not as generally supposed, akin to those in prevalent in the Elbe, the great river which gives Germany approach to the North Sea. As a consequence of these investigations he is having plans prepared for the construction of the greatest ice-breaking steamer in the world to be used in the winter.

BIG PURCHASE OF LUMBER LANDS

An American Paper Company Acquires the Gibson, Hutchison and Richards Timber Areas of Vast Extent In N. B.—White Moose Captured.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 11—(Special) Sportsmen have just returned from a hunting trip on the head waters of the Little Pokiook, where they had the rare fortune to secure a white moose. The moose is only a fair sized one. It was reported by a party of local sportsmen that they had seen either the same one or another white moose last year about this time, probably the same one. 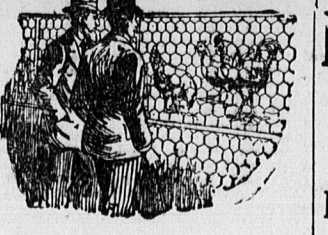
THE WIND-UP OF THE EXHIBITION

BISHOP KINGDON OF FREDRICKTON

Died Last Night After Long Illn Aged 72—Was Born In London And Came to N B Twenty Six Years Ago

FREDRICKTON, Oct 11—(Special)—His 1878 became Vicar of Good Easter Lordship Bishop Kingdon died tonight after a long illness. He was 72 years old and had been Bishop since 1891. He was born in London, England 1835, and was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge. He held a number of curacies, and in 1878 he became Vicar of Good Easter remaining there until 1881. In that year he was made a D D and was selected by the late Bishop Medley as his Coadjutor and successor in the See of Fredericton. He succeeded and was enthroned on the death of Bishop Medley in 1892.

PUBLIC MEETING TEACHERS' ASS'N

Interesting Proceedings, Address by Dr Stetson, State Superintendent of Schools for Maine, U. S. A.— Election of Officers

Thursday evening the public meeting in connection with the Teachers' Association was held in the Kindergarten Hall. His Honor Lieut. Governor McKinnon presided. Hon. Mr. Peters, President of the Board of Education, was the first speaker. He spoke of his appreciation of the work of the teachers and his realization of the inadequacy of the support they received. The principal speaker of the evening was Hon. W. Stetson, State Superintendent for the State of Maine. He took for his subject "One Point of View." His point of view was the making of an effective school. In discussing the financial side of the educational question, he asked Does the school pay? In answer he replied that there is not spent, in proportion to the importance of the subject, much money. We spent one-tenth as much for education as we do for advertising; one-sixth as much as we do for alcoholic liquors; one-half as much as we do for tobacco. Is the final product worth the cost? This address in its intensity and subjectiveness was one of the best that has been delivered on the educational question in this community for a long time. Hon. F. L. Haszard, Dr. Anderson and T. C. James, briefly addressed the meeting. In the address of each was expressed the hope that there was in store better things for the teacher than at present obtained. At Friday morning's session the prize essays in the competition for "Suggestions Improvements to the school system" were read and discussed. These essays will be published. At the afternoon session on Friday Dr. Anderson addressed the teachers at considerable length. A resolution in response to the improvement of teachers' salaries was passed and a resolution requesting teachers not to teach in a school where no summer holidays did not obtain. EXPECT TO FIND THE GERM OF LIFE

Prof Jacques Loeb Believes He is on the High Path of Discovery—Interesting Researches Along Line that has Always Attracted

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 9—Professor Jacques Loeb, biologist of the State University makes the statement that he believes the germ of life can be discovered, provided the chemical reaction surrounding the process of fertilization are investigated. "There may be a difference of opinion as to whether or not it will ever be possible to produce living matter from inanimate says Professor Loeb, "but I think we all agree that we cannot well hope to succeed in making living matter artificially unless we have a clear conception of what living matter is. Living organisms have the peculiarity of developing and reproducing themselves automatically, and it is this automatic character of which differentiates them for the time being from machines made of inanimate matter. "Hence the answer to the question of what living matter is will have to be an answer to the question, What determines the phenomena of automatic development, and reproduction? Since all life phenomena are ultimately purely chemical, the answer must consist in pointing out one or more series of definite chemical reactions for which it can be proved that they are identical with the phenomena of development and self-preservation. "It always seemed to me that the natural starting point for a search after this definite chemical reaction or series of reactions was the analysis of that process which causes the resting egg to develop into an embryo—namely, the process of fertilization. The admittance of oxygen into the fertilized egg is declared by Professor Loeb to be one of the greatest importance. Without oxygen, he says the egg cannot develop. On this point he says: "The fertilized egg cannot develop or increase the number of its nuclei unless an ample supply of free oxygen is present. As soon as oxygen is admitted to the egg which has been deprived of it the synthesis of nuclei and segmentation begin again."
