The Aberdeen arrived in port Saturday afternoon and will proceed at once to lay the large buoys.

There were about twenty passengers crossing to Pictou from this port by the Northumberland Saturday morning.

The outward freight by the Northumberland this morning will include two cars mixed freight and fourteen horses.

Seeing the wind is a rare but easy feat. The object, wherewith it may be seen is a common saw. You will then see the wind. Looking along the teeth of the saw you will see the wind pour over them as plainly as you may see water pouring over a fall.
