### Finns Destroy "Land Battleships" In Fierce Fighting

HELSINGFORS, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Destruction of three Soviet "land battleships"—30-ton tanks—was reported tonight by a Finnish army communiqué which said three other tanks and a motorized column had been smashed by field batteries on the shores of Lake Ladoga. The communiqué, reporting bitter fighting, declared 40 Russian tanks had been sent to the scrap heap during the last two days. Fighting was particularly intense north of Lake Ladoga, where the Red army has attempted to outflank Finland's "Mannerheim line." The Finnish army declared all the attacks had been repulsed. Success on other fronts also was reported by the communiqué which said: "On the Karelian Isthmus the enemy attacked many times at the Taipale River supported by extremely heavy artillery fire. All the attacks were repulsed. In the course of battle Dec. 15 and 16, 30 enemy tanks were destroyed. "Enemy attempts to cross Suunto Lake were also repulsed. "On the western Karelian Isthmus there was artillery fire and local attacks, all repulsed. Three 30-ton tanks were destroyed. Enemy attacks continued in sectors directly north of Lake Ladoga. The attacks were repulsed. "In the vicinity of Lomla two enemy battalions were dispersed. In the vicinity of Tolvaivieru our own advance slowly continued. Fierce fighting took place all day in the area of Aeglaeservi. "Certain batteries along Lake Ladoga destroyed three tanks and an enemy motorized column. "At sea there was only patrol activity. In the air enemy aircraft were active chiefly over Petsamo and over northern Lapland lesser bombing raids were undertaken. Our own air forces were quite active during the day bombing, among other things, an enemy tank detachment near the firing line. "Battle reports encouraging to Finland came from the frigid northern front where Russian forces were said to have altered before the fortifications of Salmiservi near the Norwegian frontier. Finnish troops were making a determined stand there in Arctic darkness with the temperature 13 degrees below zero. "President Kyosti Kallio, broadcasting to Finland's armed forces, appealed to the world for "substantial aid" against the Russian invaders. "There is no need of protesting our innocence regarding the outbreak of this war," the president said. "The League of Nations in which 49 nations are represented unanimously branded Russia the aggressor and 40 of these states condemned the Soviet with express lips. Not a voice was raised in her defence. "We need more active help than that so far obtained. As our cause is the just cause of the whole civilized world, we believe the civilized nations cannot leave us alone on this front."

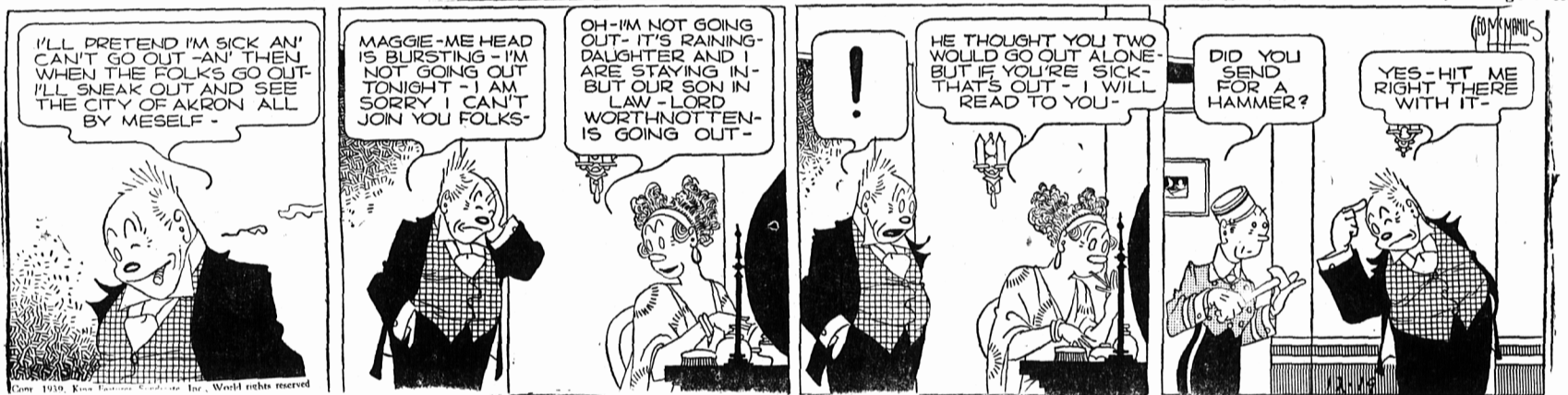
ANNA MARIE SOMERS

Sir Edward passed away at his home in England on August 10th, the last day of the 7th World's Poultry Congress. Professor Edward Brown was the pioneer in poultry education not only in England but he visited many countries of the world in the interests of the poultry industry. To all who knew him in the past twenty-five years he is known as the moving spirit in the formation of the World's Poultry Science Association. Its President for the first fifteen years and the presiding genius of the six World's Poultry Congresses. For his outstanding contribution in world poultry keeping the King knighted him in 1930.

To do honour to this great man it has been decided to accept contributions of one or two dollars to create a fund from which an annual or triennial grant will be made to the one who has made the outstanding contribution to poultry research. Canadians will want to be counted in on this for Sir Edward was always a good friend of Canada, having been here upon several occasions, the last one when he presided at the 3rd World's Poultry Congress held at Ottawa in 1927.

Canadian contributions will be received by F. M. Nash, Box 39, Charlottetown, and when all are received a special committee will be appointed by the President of the World's Poultry Association to decide what nature the memorial will take.

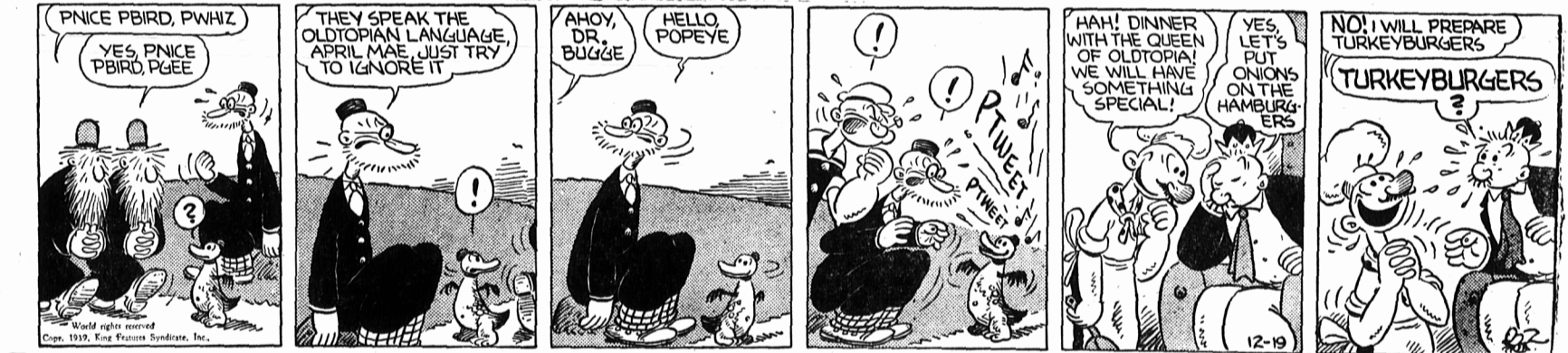

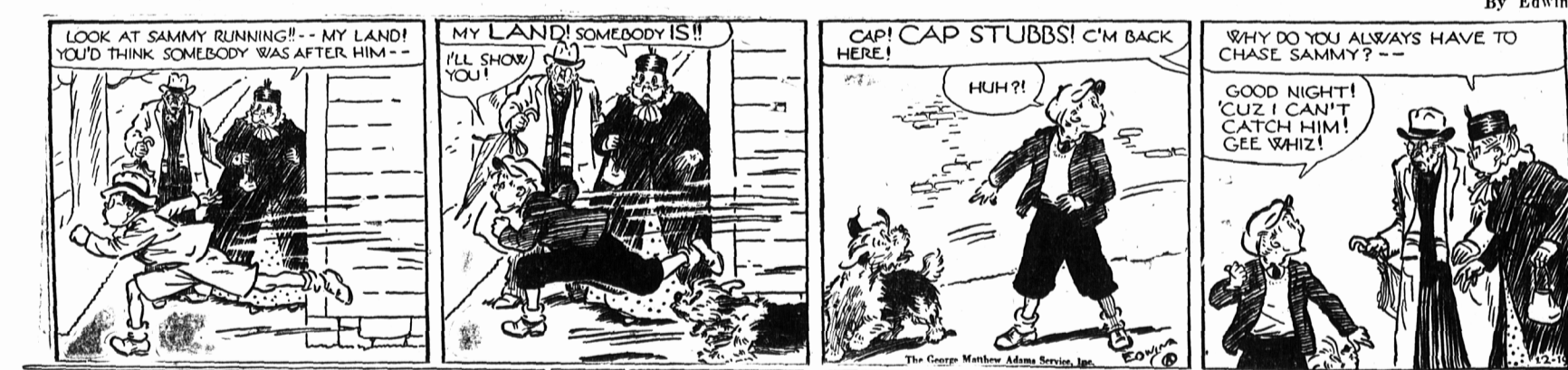

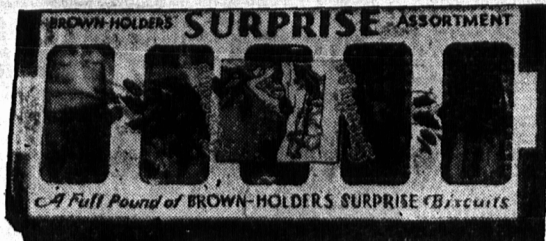

### DOMESTIC EXPORTS UP

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—(CP)—With the United States the chief customer, Canada's domestic exports in

November rose to \$97,163,176 compared with \$85,979,453 in November, 1934, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported Saturday.

Exports to the United States advanced to \$45,201,061 from \$28,386,763 in November, 1938, while exports to the United Kingdom dropped to \$30,007,651 from \$35,749,739.
