DRAW SENDS SENATORS INTO THIRD PLACE

OTTAWA, Dec. 19.—Ottawa Senators and Chicago Black Hawks played a 2-2 overtime tie here tonight before 4,500 people. The divided points gave Senators undisputed possession of third place in the Canadian section of the National Hockey League and kept Hawks in the hunt for leadership in the American group.

Allan Shields put Senators ahead at the nine-minute mark in the first period, taking a pass from Max Kaminsky. Paul Thompson evened it up early in the third period with Lionel Conacher and Dock Romnes in the assisting roles.

The teams went into overtime, Chicago pressing all the way. Big Tuffy Abel, who hasn't scored a goal since the 1931-32 season, broke his non-scoring record when he lumbered up the ice, half-way through the overtime and beat Beveridge from 20 feet out after taking a pass from Tommy Cook.

It looked like a win for Chicago until Roger Jenkins took a tripping penalty. George Reuter threw five forwards over the boards and Dese Roche snared the equalizer on a double pass from Earl Roche and Jerry Shannon.

Shore On Verge Of Collapse

BOSTON, Dec. 19.—The stubborn, unyielding battle that Irvin "Ace" Bailey, injured Toronto Maple Leaf player, is waging for his life continued unabated tonight at the City Hospital. The latest report of Dr. Donald Munro, who performed two delicate operations on the star hockey player's fractured skull, stated that he still held the slight gain he made after last night's sudden relapse.

"He is just as he was this morning," the report said, "no better and no worse. He continued to take nourishment through the vein and his chart is a bit nearer normal than it was this morning. His temperature is holding between 101 and 102, his pulse is 80 and tending downward and his respiration is close to normal, ranging from 25 to 30.

"He slept this afternoon and it seemed to be a natural nap. He is unconscious but can be aroused. It is naturally advisable to avoid all possible strain and not arouse him any more than is necessary.

Brain Condition Satisfactory
"The brain condition seems to be satisfactory as far as I can determine. He has definitely got no worse during the last 24 hours."

In view of the fact another member of the attending staff of physicians hurried to Bailey's bedside at one o'clock this morning and performed a lumbar puncture coincident with announcement the patient had taken a turn for the worse, the statement of Dr. Munro that "Ace" had "got no worse during the last 24 hours" was taken to mean he had not lost ground in that period.

Bailey's condition showed improvement after the early morning operation.

Shore on Verge of Collapse
Edie Shore of the Boston Bruins, the other principal in professional hockey's most serious accident in 30 years, continues in a terribly harassed mental state. Broken in mind and spirit since he collided with Bailey in last Tuesday night's game, he was on the verge of a collapse today when he asked Charles F. Adams, President of the Boston Bruins, to select a place to which he could retire and regain his shattered health.

FIELDING RECORDS WELL SCATTERED

CHICAGO, Dec. 19.—Fielding records were few and well spread around during the 1933 American League championship season, the official averages reveal.

It remained for a veteran, Willie Kamm, Cleveland's third baseman, to set the only new individual mark for handling his position. For the seventh time during his career, Kamm led the league's third basemen, and turned in a new record percentage mark of .984. However, his record of 379 chances in 131 games was short of the Major League high.

Another Indian star, Dick Porter, tied the Major League record for outfielders, turning in an average of .996, and shares the distinction with Sam West of St. Louis who had the same figure in 1928.

In an 11-inning game with Detroit on August 13, the Milwaukee Pole unlimbered his arm and on successive plays, threw out runners who attempted to score from second base on long singles, cutting them down at the plate.

Joe Kuhel, Washington's young first baseman, putting in his first year as a regular, ranked first with .996. He participated in 126 double plays, three less than Irving Burns of St. Louis. Henry Greenburg of Detroit, tied the world mark for unassisted double plays by a first baseman when he made two against St. Louis on September 3.

Comes To Terms With Garden

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—(A.P.)—Tommy Loughran, former light heavyweight champion, has accepted the challenger's end 12-1-2 per cent for a heavyweight title match with Primo Camera in Miami Feb. 22, Madison Square Garden announced today.

Loughran's insistence of a larger percentage of the gate receipts had offered a minor bar to the match. The Garden is waiting for word from Louis Sorel, Camera's Italian manager in Italy, of final acceptance of terms for the champion.

STEWARTS AND HOLMANS TIE
Keith Acorn's goal five seconds before the final bell gave Stewart's bakery an even break with Holmans at the forum last night, the game ending 1-1. It was a scheduled game of the City Hockey League.

Bill Brown's first period goal on a pass from Bob Holman, looked to be good enough, but a desperate five-man attack by Stewart's in the final period brought about a tie being called.

The stopping of Price, in Holman's net, was the big feature of the game. With his team weakened by penalties he stood off attack after attack but finally bowed as Acorn's drive rustled the cords.

WINGS HOLD LEAD OVER BLACKHAWKS

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—(A.P.)—Detroit Red Wings got an early goal tonight and protected it with a rock-ribbed defence to defeat New York Americans 1-0 in a bruising but scarcely interesting National Hockey League game. The victory enabled the Wings to hold their place at the head of the League's American Division safe from Chicago's threat.

Cooney Weiland, little leader of Detroit's "speed" line, scored the only goal when a penalty left the Amerks a man short in the first period. A three-man rush sent Workers down on the ice and Weiland's shot caromed in, apparently from behind the net.

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GRACIE GETS LONE TALLY IN OVERTIME

BOSTON, Dec. 19.—In action on their home rink for the first time since Irvin "Ace" Bailey suffered his tragic accident, the Boston Bruins tonight noosed out the Montreal Maroons 1-0 in a quiet overtime game that was featured by the sensational play of the rival goals.

Bob Gracie broke up the game after 124 of overtime play with a fluky tally. He was trying to pass to Harry Oliver and his high shot struck the stick of Cyclone Wentworth, Maroon defenceman, and caromed into the Montreal net to decide the game.

Wheat Export Shows Decrease

OTTAWA, Dec. 19.—A decrease of almost 2,000,000 bushels was shown in wheat export clearances for the week ending Dec. 15, as compared with the preceding week, and a decrease of more than 1,500,000 bushels as against the corresponding week of last year, according to a report issued today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

Export clearances of wheat during the week ending Dec. 15 amounted to 1,382,697 bushels compared with 3,228,748 in the previous week and 3,051,163 a year ago. Clearances by ports were as follows, the figures in brackets being those of last year: Vancouver-New Westminster 664,426 (2,067,163), United States ports 375,000 (594,000), Montreal 199,171 (nil), West Saint John 144,100 (408,000), Halifax nil (72,000), total 1,382,697 (3,061,163). Twenty weeks ending Dec. 15: Montreal 31,226,484 (45,156,144), West Saint John 144,100 (741,890), Halifax 18,867 (72,000), Victoria nil (596,121), Prince Rupert nil (877,813), total 72,899,750 (112,113,396).

Tropical Storm Claims Lives
