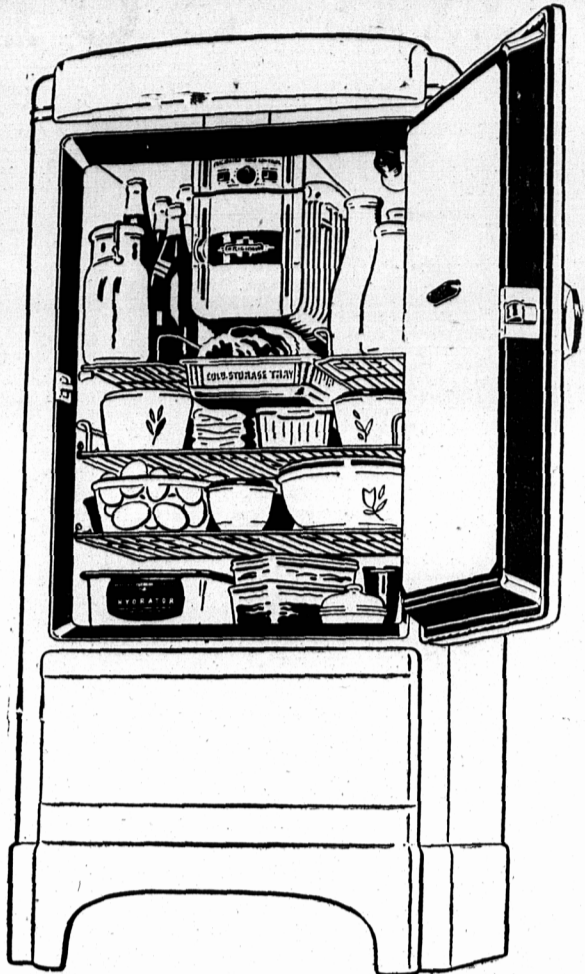

mediately successful.

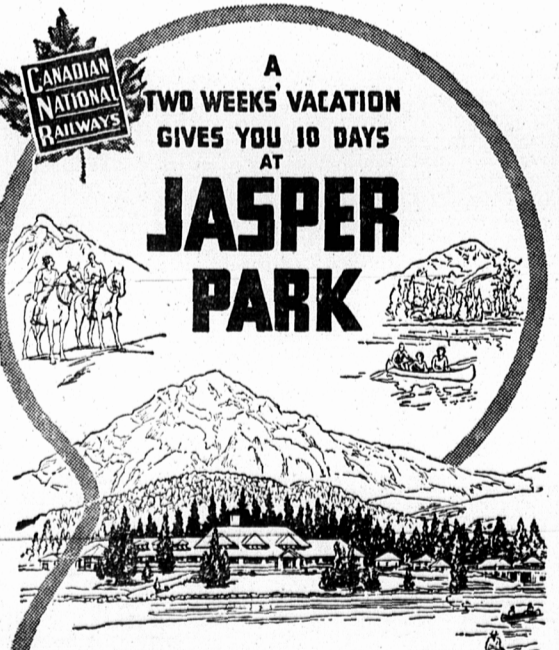

MR. HEATH E. CROSBY

"I would live in a house by the side of the road
And be a friend to man."

At the funeral of the late Heath E. Crosby on May 23rd his pastor feelingly referred to the loss suffered by the church in the passing of a loyal member and faithful Deacon, the loss to the district of one who had always given generously of time and energy for the promotion of all that was best in community life, and the infinite loss to the home of one who had always the happy faculty of making his home "our" home.
