PATRIOTIC APPEAL TO POTATO GROWERS

(Science Service News) From time to time, officers of the Dominion Department of Agriculture have observed that regulations governing the importation of potatoes from countries quarantined by the laws of Canada are sometimes evaded by persons who are unaware of these regulations.

Usually the original quantity concerned is small, but occasionally large stores of potatoes are brought in by all kinds of coasting and ocean-going vessels that regularly call at Canadian wharves. Sometimes people pick up an odd potato and pass it on to friends as more or less of curiosity. This potato is planted and soon a variety may become established whose origin and source are unknown, and a new disease may appear in Canada. So far Departmental officers by their persistent efforts to protect commercial potato growers have been able to avert serious consequences by prompt action. But as long as the possibilities of casual importations exist, there is danger to the potato crops of Canada.

An urgent appeal is therefore made to all Canadians to be very careful to look-out for any trouble affecting potatoes. Any suspicious potato tuber, whether grown commercially or in a private garden, may be sent free of charge to the Dominion Botanist, Science Service, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, for identification. Such cooperation will be appreciated and will constitute a valuable service to Canada.

Among the especially serious diseases is the notorious wart disease (formerly known as potato cancer) prevalent in most European countries and Newfoundland. While it is unlikely that European potato-growing circumstances under the present conditions in Canada will result in Canadian trade with Newfoundland. In view of the fact that usually only a few tubers are brought in, it will be realized that it may take some years before this

distances. But finally it locates some cosy nook under stone or bit of wood, there to curl up for its winter sleep. It is well known that the hair which covers the bodies of many caterpillars serves as a very efficient means of protection. Few birds will attack these "woolly bears" as they are called. Should you disturb the Isabella, at once it curls up and becomes to all appearances a miniature porcupine in black and brown bristles. But this caterpillar finds another use for these bristles. In some mysterious manner it is able to transform its fur into the outer covering of its cocoon. So, if some day either late in fall or early in spring, you should roll over a stone and uncover a tiny mass of densely-matted black and brown fur, tightly woven about a sleeping cocoon you will know it is Isabella.

Then with the genial days of spring, the little fur-wrapped sleeper feels the urge to stir and, like all its race, enter upon the new life, so different from the lot of the humble caterpillar. The black and brown traveller which we knew last November, so anxious to find shelter from the storms of winter, has been transformed into a beautiful golden yellow moth which flutters off in the early air of the spring evening. Though moths are among our most abundant insects, the Isabella has few near relatives. One of these resides in far Argentina, another in distant Turkistan, and we, in Canada and United States, have only one other member in the family. Strange how Dame Nature bids her children live far apart from their closest relatives! I wonder if the nature-lovers in those distant climes find a black and brown caterpillar hurrying a

long seeking shelter from the gathering storms of winter— in whichever month it may occur in that part of the world. But whatever may be the habits and customs of the far-off relatives of our Isabella moth, to us in this Northern clime it will always be the last insect we see after winter closes in; and one of the first to bestir itself with the coming of better days.
