Club were having the use of the Market Building next week. William Hennessey, Chairman of the Police Committee, the critic of the police officers, was summoned on a call. He also wanted to know what was done with the seized liquor stored in the Marshall's Office. In answer to the letter question he was told that as soon as a conviction was made an order was given by the Magistrate to either destroy it at once or send it to the prohibition headquarters. In regard to the service of the police officers, Councillor Moran and Yeo supported by the Mayor said that they thought the officers were doing their duty as much as possible. His Worship said it was impossible for the officers to be in every part of the town at the one time. Councillor Hennessey said he wanted the Marshal to see that the officers responded immediately when a call came to the station.

Councillor Blanchard spoke on the drain back of the Milk Factory which has been so much discussed and nothing of importance done. His Worship then named Thursday evening at 8 o'clock as the date to bring the matter up before the Board of Health.

Councillor Moran spoke of boys and girls riding bicycles on the sidewalk and said the Chief of Police should see that this is stopped. Councillor Hennessey said some thing should be done in regard to controlling or stopping smoking by young boys. The Marshall said that he always checked side-walk bicyclists when he had the opportunity. In regard to young lads smoking he said he also spoke to any he caught in the act—which is hard to do as the smoker when he sees a policeman throws the cigarettes away. Councillor Yeo said that the officers should make every effort to find out the source where the cigarettes were bought. The meeting then adjourned.
