Back To The Simple Truths

New Year Message of the Archbishop of Canterbury—Resolve That Peace Shall Be Wrought
 (From the Nova Scotian and Weekly Chronicle)

The Archbishop of Canterbury addressed the following New Year message to the clergy and laity of his diocese:

THE AFTERMATH, 1923

Ours has been a time more stern and strenuous than any that our sires or grandfathers knew. In our best and bravest, quiet thought was crowded out. Action prompt and tireless took its place. We have now the aftermath, and it is bewilderingly different from anything we had looked for. In one sense they are quieter days, and in other respects many are claiming a light in England tranquility in place of restlessness and strife. But mists are often thick in quiet days, and our very perplexities bid us think and think and pray.

Life's skein is tangled; we need light for its unravelling. And instead we find, or think we find, mere larkness and confusion. Need it be so? Once God said, "Let there be light, and there was light." Let there be light in earth's story come Christmas Day in Bethlehem. What for? "To give light to them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace."

That guidance is just what we want today, and it will be ours in proportion to our using of the light. It is meant for people, not for peoples. Let us light the Gentiles, the whole League of Nations; to lighten our footsteps in Europe this new year and all the years.

To those who watch and think, it is surely becoming increasingly plain that in the Gospel of Jesus Christ lies the clue for the world's vagaries. Where that Gospel is set firmly in men's hearts there is at least a foothold on the upward path. Where that Gospel is hid, whether the land call itself Christian or non-Christian, there is darkness and the shadow of death.

Look out upon the world as the new year comes to birth. In these which we had hoped would be the quietest days we are confronted, and some of us dismayed, by whole banks of gloomy and perplexing clouds.

First, there are the appalling sufferings and horrors of the nearer East, and the dense, I had almost said the inextricable, entanglements of Central Europe with all their accompanying strife of tongues.

Widespread Resolve For Peace
 Yet never, as I believe, in the whole history of Europe, has there been so firm, so thoughtful, and so all so widespread a desire or resolve that peace shall indeed be wrought. The League of Nations is not a sanguine phase. It is already a working reality. It is a step from which there can be no drawing back—a step towards the attainment of the goal on which our eyes are set.

Nearer home the light of Ireland lies heavy upon our hearts, and the trials of the dispossessed and homeless who have crossed or who have not crossed St. George's Channel, have a claim both practical and pathetic upon every one of us. And meantime the gaunt spectre of unemployment flouts the effort of every political necromancer.
