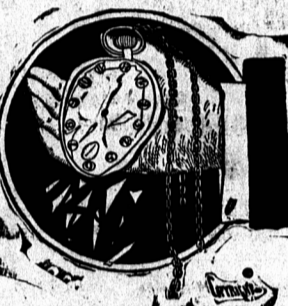

\$1,500 REQUEST FOR VINCENT ASTOR

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Oct. 18.—On a scrap of yellow paper John Rhea Barton Willing, brother of Mrs. Ava Willing Astor, wrote in lead pencil his will disposing of an estate valued at \$100,000 and upwards. The testament, one of the oddest ever entered in the Register of Wills' office, was admitted to probate today. Mr. Willing, who forsook the gayeties of society to travel abroad in search of violins of old masters, died of diphtheria in the Jefferson Hospital last month. He was a bachelor, and occupied the old Willing mansion in South Broad street.

One of the features of the will is a bequest of \$1,500 to Vincent Astor, his nephew. The bulk of the estate, which is held in trust, is divided between Mrs. Astor and Mrs. Susan R. W. Lawrence, another sister. The will makes no mention of a valuable collection of portrait and other art works, which are among the treasures accumulated by Mr. Willing in the South Broad street house.

Mrs. Astor and Mrs. Lawrence arrived in this city from New York Thursday night and are staying at the Ritz-Carlton. Mrs. Astor waived her right to act as executrix in favor of the Pennsylvania Company for Insurance on Lives and Granting of Annuities.

GREAT-GRANDPA, 78, ELOPS; IS FORGIVEN.

ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 20.—Capt. William Rose of Linwood, N. J., seventy-eight, and a great-grandfather, eloped with Mrs. Mary E. Rucker, sixty-five, a wealthy widow of the same town, and married her in Pleasantville, N. J. They have been forgiven by their children.

SPORTING NEWS

THANKSGIVING DAY RIFLE SHOOTING

A very successful and enjoyable event was the Thanksgiving shoot that took place on Kensington range, Charlottetown, on Monday. With fair weather, favorable shooting conditions, a large number of riflemen taking part, keen competition and good fellowship all through, everything tended to the excellent sport that resulted, for which a good deal of enthusiastic Mr. W. S. Louison, whose good services were acknowledged at the close of the day's shoot by the cheers of the assembly, and the presentation of a bottle of Paine's Celery Compound!

The riflemen that competed came not only from Charlottetown, but also from the nearby country and from Summerside, too. The principal event was the team match for the silver trophy presented by Capt. D. A. McKinnon for competition on Thanksgiving Day every year. Seven teams of five each competed, and the match was won by the Fourth Regiment Club's team after a very close fight. Sgt. Landrigan's last two shots at the two 200 yards range decided the event. On account of the falling light the 500 and 600 yards ranges were shot first, and the 200 yards was taken last. Landrigan was one of the last trio shooting at that range. His first six shots resulted in two inners and four bulls; he wanted a magpie to give victory to his side; he put on a bulseye, and received the plaudits of his teammates. So keen was the competition that there was a tie for second place the first and second teams up on by the Charlottetown Civilians Rifle Club making equal totals, 470 points each, or three points fewer than the Fourth's team score. As the C. R. C. No. 2 team, however, had the better total at the 600 yards, the longest range, they counted out No. 1 and so was awarded the second place. No. 1 getting third; Summerside, fourth; the York Club's No. 1 team fifth; the C. R. C. "Old Boy" team, sixth; and the York Club's No. 2 team, seventh.

Concurrently with the shoot for the match shoot, three other competitions, for individuals, were arranged, being named the General, the All Comers and the Specials. Entrance fees were charged, and prizes were made up from the fees after deducting the payment of the markers. Details of the winnings in these competitions are set out below.

There were, besides, a number of special prizes offered by various sportsmen. The winning team of the McKinnon Match—get each a badge, presented by Col. H. M. Davison; the second team, each a silver spoon, given by a well-known citizen of Charlottetown; the third team also each a silver spoon, presented by the man of the Summerside Rifle Club. As regards individuals, Lieut. Ritchie offered a silver medal to the man making the highest score that day over the three ranges. By one of fortune's queer turns, however, he was the man who filled that bill, making the splendid total of 100 points. But, of course, he did not want his own present, and so the medal fell to Sgt. Landrigan, whose privilege it was to be the next highest scorer, with 99 points;—another magnificent score. Sgt. Landrigan also won the half-sovereign which Major Leigh had given for the men making the second highest score. As the maker of the third highest score, Mr. L. R. Allen, of Summerside, won a telescope presented by Mr. G. F. Hutchison; and Mr. R. V. Longworth, as the maker of the fourth highest score, won a cut-glass water bottle which was presented by Mr. W. K. Rogers.

Capt. Webb Stanley, with a score of 95 points, was the winner of the silver medal which Mr. W. S. Louison had presented for the man making the highest score of those who had not previously won the prize this year; as second prize in this class Mr. W. Davison won a leather wallet which was presented by Mr. G. Moore; while for third prize of \$1 was won by Lieut. W. Allan. The prize of a Waterbury gold fountain pen which was presented by Dr. J. C. McDonald, was won by Mr. George Rogers as the maker of the highest net score at 600 yards 34 out of 35, the possible.

There was another prize, but it was not won, however. This was the silver medal presented by Capt. Webb Stanley to the man making a score over three ranges of 100 points or more; those who had made such a score previously being barred. Consequently, though Lieut. Ritchie scored a hundred points, he was not eligible for the medal, which the donor generously leaves open for competition for the balance of the shooting season.

As to the standard of shooting, it was of a high order; there were a good many 34's while there were two 35's possible, one being made by Mr. P. Barlow, and the other by Mr. J. M. Crockett, both being scored at the 500 yards range. In the team shoot, the highest average at the 200 yards was made by the Fourth Regiment team, 32 points per man; at the 500 yards, the highest average was made by the Summerside team, 32.4 points per man; and at the 600 yards by the C. R. C.'s second team, 31.6 pts. per man.

At the end of the day's shooting three hearty cheers were given for Capt. McKinnon.
