FUNERAL SERVICES.—At the funeral of the late Mr. M. E. Hall, of Bradalbane, whose death was reported some days ago, the funeral services were conducted by Mr. Auld, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Crowe. (Pat. & Ex.)

A NARROW ESCAPE.—On Saturday morning one of the telephone men met with an accident which happily did not prove serious. While working with a companion winding in a telephone wire near the Kindergarten corner the wire came in contact with an electric wire, the workman receiving such a shock that he was thrown to the ground with great force. His companion quickly took off his coat, covered the wire, pulling it out of the injured man's hand, who except for the severe shock and slight bruises was not seriously hurt.

INTERESTING RELICS.—Dr Miles Martin, of Boston, who is at present visiting his old home in Heatherdale, brought with him some very interesting relics of Prince Edward Island antiquity, namely, a map of the Island published in London, March 1, 1798—one hundred and seventeen years ago. There is also an almanac of 1826, nearly a century old. It is annotated on every page and the names of several old Island families are written there. Dr. Martin has kindly offered to hand these relics over to the Public Library in order that they may thus be preserved in the archives of the province.

CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH.—Evangelist Lowell C. McPherson preached at both services in the Central Christian Church yesterday. His subject at the morning service was "The New Birth" and at the evening service he spoke upon the topic "Theoretical and Practical Religion." Spirited audiences greeted Evangelist McPherson at both services, and his sermons were delivered with that earnestness and eloquence which characterize his preaching. It is fully expected Mr. McPherson will again occupy the pulpit of this church next Sunday at both morning and evening services. At the evening service Miss Grace Sheppard sang a solo very effectively.

LEG BAIL.—Yesterday morning, about seven o'clock, John Sherry, a prisoner confined in Queens County Jail, left that institution without leave and without even informing the jailor or any of the officials whether he would return voluntarily or not. It seems that Sherry had been confined to jail under a commitment issued by the Stipendiary Magistrate for the City of Charlottetown for a breach of the Prohibition Act and at the same time was under a warrant of commitment awaiting the action of the Grand Jury, which meets in this city on Tuesday next, on a charge of "robbery from the person." The term of imprisonment for the breach of the Prohibition Act has expired, so that Sherry was really detained under the commitment for the serious charge of robbing a man named Burge. If the Grand Jury at its coming sitting should find a true bill under the robbery charge then Sherry would have to face a trial before a petit jury. The Guardian has been unable to obtain the real facts as to how Sherry succeeded in leaving the jail without the aid of a writ of habeas corpus or in due form of law, although next Tuesday the Supreme Court meets, in the words of the High Sheriff's proclamation, for the purpose of a "general jail delivery." It is the fact, however, that Sherry has so far followed the footsteps of Phillips and is still at large. The circumstances of the escape having been communicated to High Sheriff Horne, he immediately took such steps as were within his power to recapture Sherry, but so far without success. No doubt the Grand Jury will make a thorough and complete investigation of the way and manner in which Sherry got clear of the jail, when the facts which the Guardian has been unable to obtain, will be brought to light.
